We continue to improve on our ability to choose trusted servants. As a result, we have better trained trusted servants, and we have moved away from the 'warm body syndrome.'

A. The delegate team has continued to raise the level of service delivery in the Region. During this past cycle, we conducted 34 workshops (ten on the changing stories in the Basic Text; three on the new Youth IPs; eight on the IDTs; six on the CAR; three on "Consensus Based Decision Making;" one on the PR Handbook; and three on "How to be an Effective GSR"), and we attended 26 ASCs. Additionally, the team hosted two Regional Assemblies.

B. The AL/NWFL Regional Convention, Fun in the Sun, continues to grow in popularity. We restarted this convention two years ago with the help of trusted servants from the

Georgia and Florida Regions and the permission of the North Atlanta Area who were the original hosts. On April 24 - 27, 2008, the AL/NWFL Region will host Fun in the Sun 30 at Panama City Beach, FL.

What additional information would you like to share with other conference participants? The AL/NWFL Region is slowly shifting to a "project based" system for delivering Regional services. So far, we have utilized this method twice. Instead of using a seated subcommittee, we created work groups with the goal of accomplishing a specific task and then disbanding. This method worked well with our Public Relations efforts at the Alabama Judicial College and the Alabama School of Alcohol and other Drug Studies (ASADS).

I participated in a panel discussion in one Area. I have been a co-facilitator in three workshops in my own Area. In organising these workshops we were mindful that we needed to make them fun for members. Feedback indicated that the workshops were useful to members. Generally the workshops raised awareness for members about keeping meetings safe and the necessity to elected suitable trusted servants and support those people. We used the guidelines and adjusted the format that were available from the NAWS website to suit our purposes

Our Region shared an information booth at 2007 Australasian Professional Society of Alcohol and other Drug Conference. We also delivered a presentation based on our survey results at the same conference in late 2006. We have also provided a submission to the Corrections Department on their policy for volunteers in prisons and have just published an IP on our survey results. These IPs are for use both withinthe fellowship and for outside organisations to show that Narcotics Anonymous is a viable recovery option in our community.

The change from PI to PR has given our Region a broader perspective and attention to public relations efforts. We believe that these efforts have given us a higher profile and will increase our credibility as a recovery option in New Zealand.

We have an national free to caller phoneline which diverts calls to the nearest Area. The costs are shared by the Areas and the national number means we capture all calls from around the country regardless of how remote. As a region we have researched the possibility of running a pilot live phone line in one Area but found there is not enough people to do the work at the present time. We are confident that eventually this will be a possibility for our Region.

We then, via zonal experience and then back to region, did the updated versions of the 'Building Strong Home Groups' Worksheet and 'Area Planning Tool' The effect has been great. Our region has 2 new areas so the 'Area Planning Tool' is not something that is new and unusual. We did get the 'Why do we need this response' from some in our more established areas.

I asked the established areas to start fresh with each new sub committee term and try to apply the Plan during each new year. Then maybe it can help develop to the area planning stage.

Our Region has done One (1) School Presentation; 10 Public Forums, ie: Drug Courts, Probation & Juvenile Facilities and General Public through area PR efforts. We also presented at Four (4) Treatment Facilities.

The Arkansas Region Phone Line number is 800 338 8750. This number covers the entire region. I have been told by several Truck Drivers, passing through, that it is one of the best in the United States. We use an answering service. They have all our updated meetings and addresses. We also use a 'Patch' system. We hold Phone Line Committee workshops. Once an Addict completes a workshop and has at least one year clean they can be placed on the patch list. The answering service finds a location for the caller than calls an approved addict in that city of nearest location. it is very effective.

Both areas that have help lines are pleased with their efforts. The Arkansas Region has not had any complaints regarding those areas.

We also have a Arkansas Region Website and are re-vamping it as we type. There are two (2) area web pages and a few others are exploring.

If yes, did you workshop the discussion questions in addition to the motions?

Yes, to date we have done a full workshop at our Region Service Committee and 4 group or area workshops. I am scheduled to do 5 more area workshop during March.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts?

The three biggest concerns are:

Motion 2 'Why so many changes in one motion?' There is a growing minority pushing for two books. A Basic Text with Book One only and then a second book with the stories;

Some . California Mid-State Region

The California Mid-State Region of Narcotics Anonymous (CMSRNA) is located in the heart of the great Central Valley of California. The Region runs from Lodi in the North to Porterville in the South and from the Gold Rush towns of the Sierras in the East to the eastern edge of the Coastal Range in the West. Our Region is comprised of seven Areas encompassing the Counties of San Joaquin, Calaveras, Amador, Tuolumne, Stanislaus, Merced, Mariposa, Fresno, Madera, Kings and Tulare. These seven Areas are: Central California NA; Central Sierra NA; Central Sierra South NA; Central Valley North NA; Foothill; Kings / Tulare and Stanislaus Valley Groups of NA. Culturally our Region runs a gamut from rural to large city living environments.

There are three hundred thirty-nine (339) weekly recovery meetings, with starting times ranging from 6:30 am to 10:00 pm, with a heavy concentration around the lunchtime and evening (6 pm – 8 pm) hours. The Spanish-speaking community is served by sixteen (16) of these meetings being presented either in Spanish or a combination of English / Spanish. Some of these meetings are presented by the same Group on different days or times. Membership in all Areas is growing, perhaps due to SB 36, resulting in a management challenge at times to secure meeting facilities that will accommodate the attendees.

This is the first WSC for both myself as the Regional Delegate and Doug C. as the Regional Delegate Alternate. We were both elected in May 2007 to our current positions.

Donations and Literature

CMSRSC does not have a Regional Service Office, nor do we sell literature directly to anyone. All of our Areas purchase their literature either directly from NAWS or the Northern California Regional Service Office.

The information pertaining to the amount of literature distributed by the seven Area H&I Sub-committees is currently unavailable.

Regional Service Committee Structure

California Mid-State Regional Service Committee (CMSRSC) embraced the concept of Regional Information Coordinators (RICs) as presented in the previous version of the *Guide to Local Services*. Establishing a RIC for Hospitals & Institutions, Public Information, Activities and Literature at the Regional level. Their mandate is; "To act as a resource to groups and members in their efforts to carry the N.A. message His/Her direction is to try and become the most informed person regarding their area of responsibility."

CMSRNA funds the attendance of their RD and RDA at the Western States Zonal Forum and the Western Service Learning Days in addition to attendance at NAWS Workshops and the World Service Conference. The RICs are also funded for attendance to the WSLD and various NAWS Workshops that may be scheduled.

CMSRNA produces a biennial convention that attracts between 1500 and 2100 attendees, with 900 to 1,000 actually registering! These great registration numbers relieve considerable pressure in funding the conventions which rotate between cities in the larger Areas, (Stockton and Modesto in the north, Fresno and Visalia in the south). Our Areas also hold Unity Days and Area Celebrations at various times throughout the year.

Legal Entity and Tax Filing Status

Over the past several years CMSRSC has been researching the legal entity and income tax filing responsibilities as a Region, mostly due to the income that is realized from the Regional Conventions. For the first time ever, CMSRNA filed an Income Tax Return for 2006. We did this with much apprehension and discussion amongst ourselves, a business attorney and a Certified Public Account. The professional consensus was, "Why fix it if it's not broken, but, continuing to ignore the tax laws may subject CMSRNA to some IRS pain in the future." The California Mid-State Region

Fellowship consensus was, "If we are to be a part of society what makes us believe we do not need to be accountable for filing Income Tax Returns?" Currently we are considered to be an "Unincorporated Member Benefit Association" in the eyes of the IRS; more will be revealed I'm sure.

Regional Insurance

CMSRSC has continued to encourage each Area to ensure their recovery meeting information is kept up to date at NAWS, along with their Area Service Committee contact information. Even though this is a relatively easy chore, it is still a chore and easy to let slip between the cracks. For CMSRNA this is especially critical due to the fact that our Regional Insurance Policy is based on recovery meetings registered with NAWS. We hope to address this detail in the next policy negotiation because the consensus is that registration with NAWS should not be of concern with our insurance carrier. This may prove to be an uphill battle due to the fact that our recovery meetings are somewhat changeable in a short period of time and there needs to be a method to ensure coverage for newly formed meetings after the current meeting list is forwarded to the insurance broker.

This past insurance cycle, CMSRNA secured coverage with Philadelphia Insurance through our previous broker. This brings up an on-going nagging feeling regarding our Regional Insurance Annual Premium which currently runs to almost \$9,000.00! This seems a little excessive for a Region that carries approximately one third the recovery meetings and nowhere near the size of convention, learning days, Regional or Area events as our Northern California Region neighbors. At the Western States Zonal Forum held in Ontario, CA in 2007 this item was discussed at some length (again) with several other Regions sharing that their Annual Premiums were substantially less even with more recovery meetings, larger events and more members.

The hope is that we will eventually secure affordable coverage more in line with our actual claims history. In the fifteen years we have had insurance coverage I can only recall one or two instances where members have filed claims.

Regional Forums / Issue Discussion Topics

The Regional Committee Members (RCMs) gave their approval to the Regional Delegate and the Alternate Delegate to go forth throughout the Region and present four Regional Forums for the seven Areas, (two of the Regional forums were shared by four of the Areas). The Issue Discussion Topics were the agenda topics of the day, with the attendees identifying the order of discussion. The anticipation and participation of the members that chose to attend the first presentation was encouraging. I believe that the discussion model (large group / small group) utilized had a lot to do with this response. We are hopeful that the RCMs will approve of the expense to present future workshops in the remaining Areas. We specifically presented the Regional Forums separate from the CAR Workshops to allow ample time to focus on the topics being presented.

CAR Workshops

We are looking forward to a well-attended round of Conference Agenda Report (CAR) Workshops. Several of our Areas have already stated a desire for one in their locale. Our first workshop is scheduled for February 9th in Modesto and our second is scheduled for March 8th. It is hoped that each of the Areas will request a workshop, considering the 6th Edition Basic Text Approval Draft and several other items of interest that are included in the 2008 CAR in addition to the discussion questions. We are hopeful these presentations will be more than just a "vote counting" event. To allow for active discussion and participation we are scheduling six hours for each workshop. This time slot worked well for the Regional Forum presented in December 2007.

Area H&I and PI Sub-committees & Public Relations

Each of our Area Hospitals & Institutions Sub-committees carries panels into a large number of County, State and Federal Institutions. Panel Members also attend several existing NA Meetings as outside guests at some of these facilities. We are anticipating the day that a state-wide clearance system may be in place and accepted by the State Facilities. This may facilitate the growth of a pool of members willing to travel to different institutions by standardizing the clearance process.

Some of our Area Public Information Sub-committees are better supported than others, taking part in several health fairs and Red Ribbon Days annually. One of our Areas, (Central Sierra South NA), has formed a Public Relations Sub-committee, combining the H&I and PI Subcommittees with fairly positive results. Their pool of supporting members seems to have increased as a result of this combination. Some of the other Areas within CMSRNA are investigating this combination of resources.

The phone lines / help lines or each Area are managed by the Public Information Sub-committee. Some Areas actually have Phone Line Sub-committees as a part of the overall PI Sub-committee. CMSRSC itself does not manage any phone lines / help lines.

The ongoing public relations efforts mostly consist of raising awareness of the individual member's conduct at the various meeting locations utilized throughout CMSRNA. We are attempting to emphasize the effect our individual actions have on the public perception on NA as a whole.

Innovations and Challenges

Regional insurance continues to be a subject that generates much discussion and anxiety due to the large amount of money our annual premium demands. We are continuing to search for more affordable coverage.

Our Regional Assembly and the Issue Discussion Topics benefited from the large group / small group discussion model that has been utilized by NAWS the past several years. We are more fully implementing this model in our regional workshops, assemblies and service committee meetings. The members have embraced the change in discussion format enthusiastically, showing it by their active participation in discussion and also the discussion and feedback that occurs after the events. This discussion change seems to have actually reassured some members that Region exists to do more than "just take our money". The opinion seems to be slowly revising into "Region is putting back into the Region". What also seems to have assisted with this attitude change is the RD and RDA committing to attend every Area Service Committee meeting at least once this past year, illustrating that we are willing to make ourselves more accessible and also allowing the members to place a face with the name and position.

CMSRSC has experienced some elected members stepping away from their service positions due to family needs. This resulted in CMSRNA going without a Regional Delegate or RDA for several months last year and recently our Activities and H&I RIC resigned from their positions, which as yet remain vacant. Other members are stepping in to fill in for the time being. Our elections are held in May, but we continue to attempt to fill the vacancies on a monthly basis.

The benefits of reassuring the members that Regional level trusted servants are members just as they are seem to outweigh the expense and investment of time and money necessary to travel the length and breadth of our Region. We were always welcomed at the ASC, sometimes being asked for input or to share our experience in similar circumstances, other times just being allowed a little time to introduce ourselves was all that was needed.

Through our attendance and participation at the Western States Zonal Forum, the Western Service Learning Days and the recent Sierra Sage Convention we were presented with pre-printed folders that NAWS utilizes to convey Information Pamphlets and other informational items to professionals in their own public relations efforts along with a small canvas bag printed with the Public Relations logo. To provide these items at an affordable cost would be of assistance in enhancing our credibility with professionals and as an additional benefit provide a new revenue stream for NAWS. The same thoughts apply to the Issue Discussion Topic resource materials that have been available electronically for quite a few months now. These resources are proving to be of some assistance in the presentation of the Issue Discussion Topics workshops being presented throughout the Fellowship. The cost of printing small quantities locally is cost-prohibitive and also denies NAWS another new revenue stream. For future projects especially, if the print run is allowed to overrun a moderate amount, the result may assist with Regional presentations of topics using professional quality resources and consequently providing a small amount of revenue from the sale thereof. We have offered this suggestion personally and via email to the World Board members and we would like to hear from other Regions regarding their interest or not in these resource items becoming available for purchase through the literature order form from NAWS.

Additionally CMSRNA is interested in detailed discussions with other Regions regarding their presentation of information to the insurance broker or company when renewing their regional insurance coverage. Perhaps we are not presenting some item of information in the way that is necessary to convey what our actual needs really are. We certainly do not want to prompt an increase in anyone else's insurance premium.

In Closing

CMSRNA would like to say that we are anticipating more of the same type of discussion workshops presented by NAWS that are proving to be very well received by the members of California Mid-State Region. Our members are providing enthusiastic, energetic participation and having some fun gaining information in the process. We look forward to the coming discussion topics.

In closing we would like to take this opportunity to invite everyone to our rapidly approaching regional convention, CMSRCNA X, to be held in Visalia, California on June 6 - 8, 2008.

A resounding no to new literature (Living Clean). Our region has stated that they would like to see current IPs updated with fellowship approval. They have also said that they would like to see the step-working guide updated, possibly even one for newcomers and one for member with accumulated clean time.

2008 REGIONAL REPORT

Greetings from the Chesapeake & Potomac Region!

Our region includes groups in Washington, DC, Maryland, and Virginia with Areas spreading from Frederick, Maryland (north) to Waldorf, Maryland (south), Bowie, Maryland (east) and to Reston, Virginia (west), with our Nation's Capital, Washington DC, in the heart of our Region. We have 11 Areas with a total of approximately 337 groups and 367 meetings per week, plus we carry about 345 H&I meetings per month into 70 different facilities. All of our Areas participate with our regional phoneline and one Area, Dulles Corridor, also has its own helpline. Most of our Areas purchase literature from the Free State Regional Service Center where we have two regional representatives on the Board of Directors. Our active regional committees are Hospitals and Institutions, Public Information, Phoneline, Activities, Policy and Convention Host. We meet the second Saturday of every other month, except when this date conflicts with our Regional Convention or the Mid-Atlantic Regional Learning Convenference. Our region is not incorporated and we do not carry regional insurance. We maintain a regional webpage at www.cprna.org.

Our Regional Delegate is Reesheemah Partyka, attending her third WSC, our Alternate Delegate is Anne Holte, attending her second WSC, and our Second Alternate Delegate is Allen Jackson who will be attending his first WSC as a spectator.

Our total donation to NAWS for our fiscal year (August to August) 2005-06 was \$9,329.46 and we will be making our 2006-07 donation in April. In addition we donate \$1,500.00 per year to the Latin American Zonal Forum, the Asia Pacific Zonal Forum and the European Delegates Meeting. For the 2005-06 year we received group donations in the amount of \$22,472.63. For the 2006-07 year we received donations of \$30,070.89 from our member Areas and groups plus \$30,033.51 from our regional convention. Our annual regional operating budget was \$40,910 for the 2005-06 year, of which \$19,660.44 was used, and \$34,610.00, for the 2006-07 year, of which \$24,739.60 was used. We have a regional budget of \$1,000.00 for H&I literature if an Area needs assistance.

We belong to the Autonomy Zonal Forum, which is made up of the C&P Region, Central Atlantic Region, Greater Philadelphia Region, Mountaineer Region, the Free State Region, and the Eastern Pennsylvania Region of Narcotics Anonymous. We meet twice a year and each Region hosts the meeting on a rotating basis.

We hold an annual regional convention in Ocean City, Maryland every April. The average attendance is about 5,500 which includes up to 800 indigent registrations. Our convention is incorporated as an IRS recognized tax exempt non-profit corporation. The convention corporation is accountable to the region and submits a detailed report at each regional meeting. Our convention webpage is www.cprcna.org. This year the Central Maryland area is hosting CPRCNA XXII, and the theme is "One Promise, Many Gifts." Last year the South Potomac Area hosted CPRCNA XXII with the theme "Miracle in the Mirror." In 2006, for the first time ever, three of our Areas united together to make up the Host Committee-Battlefield, Dulles Corridor, and NorVaNA—CPRCNA XX with the theme "The Ties that Bind Us". We have one area (East of the River) that holds a biannual convention at New Years Eve in Washington, DC with an average attendance of 1,500 to 2,000.

We host two regional assemblies per year to review the issue discussion topics. During the Conference year, we also host two Regional CAR Workshops where we discuss the CAR, CAR questions, and some CAT material. In past years, the RDs traveled to each individual Area to assist them with their CAR Workshops. In 2006 we decided to hold two regional workshops, in the hopes that members would attend the regional workshops and the RDs would not have to travel as much, but still provide RCMs and GSRs with background information and other assistance. This plan worked in 2006, but this year-despite holding 2 regional CAR workshops, 7 out of 11 Areas are hosting their own workshops, which the RDs will be attending. We are questioning whether we should continue to host the regional CAR workshops in the future.

Our regional H&I efforts continue to be successful, growing from 280 meetings per month in 2006 to 345 meetings in 2008. Some new and interesting successes include a meeting in the Montgomery area which is held weekly in a physical rehabilitation center/Nursing home and 2 meetings in the Frederick area which are held in an adolescent treatment center. Workshops reviewing the new Youth in Recovery literature were also held at that facility.

Our region has participated in multiple large and small public relations efforts and conducted outreach campaigns to parole officers and other judicial and correctional services. Both area and regional Public Information committees have worked with municipal festivals, health expositions and various local substance abuse workshops, held NA booths at community colleges, county fairs, health fairs, and street fairs. We have also distributed Basic Texts in local libraries, as well as the libraries of various jails and institutions within the region.

We have recently converted our phoneline system from a meeting locator with voice mail capabilities to a system that will allow us to operate as a hotline. With our new system a caller can speak directly to a live addict immediately, or leave a voicemail to request literature, meeting lists or more information. We currently have 48 volunteers who have been trained to respond to calls from people either seeking Recovery or looking for information about our meetings or other NA services. We also have an extensive "12 step" call list for each area, if an addict needs a ride to a meeting or wants to speak to someone who is local to where the addict is calling from.

The members in our region are particularly concerned about the seating criteria for both new and "split off" regions. Many believe that if we need a new policy, then the World Board should provide a project plan for developing the new criteria. We have also had concerns involving insurance, and several groups have had to change facilities because of this problem. There is also concern in our region about the approval process for new literature, and developing a more clearly defined definition of "service literature"

The NA Fellowship continues to grow in the Chesapeake and Potomac Region and remains strong.

What subject generated the most interest and discussion in your region over the past conference cycle?

There was considerable interest and discussion in leadership. Discussions focused on how to encourage effective leadership practices among trusted servants, the need for mentoring and training, the importance of carefully selecting people with skills appropriate to fulfill their service commitments, and need to work within a spirit of unity among the various service bodies.

Please share some solutions to challenges your region has faced since WSC 2006.

The Chicagoland Region has been working to overcome a lack of fellowship confidence in its ability to meet the needs of its member Areas and Groups. This lack of confidence was reflected in poor attendance by several areas, low Area donations, and a general sense of apathy toward Region and Regional service.

Overcoming this hurdle has involved two key strategies: First, the Region Executive Committee undertook a major effort to recruit talented members, several of whom had served in the past, to fill vacancies on the Regional body and the Chicago Service Office's Board of Directors. This included removing trusted servants who had proven unqualified to fulfill their duties and carefully considering the qualifications of all nominees, and not approving those deemed unsuitable.

Second, Region undertook several actions to improve the quality of communications between service bodies. This involved an emphasis on written communications by Regional trusted servants and in-person visits to member Areas by the RD team and the Executive Committee. Regional officers have also been more closely involved with the Regional Convention committee and the Board of Directors. In the financial realm, Region has restored reliable and complete reporting of all financial matters and put in place an informal open books policy: financial and other data that had previously been treated with confidentiality are now available for inspection by any member desiring access.

Please share some highlights or successes your region has experienced since WSC 2006.

As a result of the above measures, interest in Region has blossomed. The Areas have returned with donations and interest in serving at Region has increased. These leadership efforts culminated with a leadership workshop, which took place in lieu of a regularly scheduled regional meeting.

What additional information would you like to share with other conference participants?

The Region has had some experience addressing the needs of people who are missing from our meetings. In addition to seating a new Hispanic Area at Region mentioned above, CRC, the Regional convention, hosted a mini-convention targeted toward younger members, within the larger convention itself. While the main convention was going on, there were several youth oriented workshops and a youth dance.

One home group has taken a novel approach to addressing the needs of people missing from the meeting. It's a large group, and after a break it splits into two or three meetings every week. Over the years, this home group had difficulty attracting women. To address this problem, the group decided to split into a women's group and a men's group on the third week of every month. The home Group later decided to host a gay and lesbian meeting on the fourth week of the month. This seems to have had the effect of attracting more women and more gay and lesbian addicts. It also solved the difficult problem of meeting the needs of groups of addicts who don't come to NA, while preserving unity: do it within the home group! Now every month the communities in question have a place to address their individual needs while preserving the unity of the group.

Visiting the areas has really been beneficial to ability to serve the Region. Over the years, this practice had been abandoned, but visiting the Areas has allowed the RD to disseminate considerable information about worldwide developments and initiate discussion on the IDTs and other topics of interest. Without exception, there is always interest in NAWS' fellowship development efforts, especially Iran. The RD visited 13 out of the 14 Areas, and made several attempts, even travelling some length to attend the 14th Area, only to find it had been cancelled. The RD will attempt to visit the new CHANA Area prior to the conference, but no date has been scheduled.

The main challenge has been to encourage formal discussion of the IDTs. Aside from a Worldwide Workshop several years ago, the Chicagoland Region does not have a history of workshop discussions. For that matter, there has been little interest in adopting the spirit of the worldwide, discussion-based WSC. This is beginning to change. The previously mentioned leadership workshop was a new experience to many participants. It remains to be seen if these efforts catch hold. Also, the Regional Committee itself has also demonstrated the benefits of discussion-based decision making in its consensus approach to decision making.

We are looking forward to the Regional Assembly in April, to see what if any solutions that our membership may suggest.

Although in a perfect world it would have been nice to have more members in attendance, the fact that second CAR workshop had been planned, along with an event may have kept them away.

The irony here is that outside of Denver, and Colorado Springs our fellowship has been growing, inside the two largest cities our fellowship has remained about the same, as evidenced by the number of meetings currently active in our region.

We are in the process of creating a Public Relations subcommittee at the regional level, to bring create an umbrella for our Public Information, Hospitals and Institutions, Phone line, Web and Outreach functions. This was the first workshop for cycle 2006 – 2008, held shortly after the WSC 2006 (one month later) This activity helped the WSO servers to work on the methodology details and improve their perspective on what was there to enhance about the IDT profiles. It worked to make the questions more comprehensive and easy to understand from a translation point of view.

With James and Johnny as facilitators we were able to embrace a discussion-based approach and participate from "small groups" at round tables or in "full group" sessions to build consensus and wrap up conclusions.

The following IDTs were discussed:

- Building Strong Home Groups
- Leadership in NA
- Who is Missing from our Meetings
- Public Information

The workshop attendance reached 180 participants from different levels of the service structure. The main goals were successfully covered through out two days of intensive work:

- Motivate participants to strengthen a more responsible attitude.
- Raise the conscious level about carrying the message to public in general.

Along 2007 follow up workshops took place at a regional/area level, more significantly at their annual conferences. There was a Regional Inventory workshop to sense the growth of our fellowship and detect needs as well as other minor activities at a group level.

We have been able to gather a very stable team through motivation and training. There are 14 members, 10 currently rotating their service shifts. They handle an average of 110 incoming calls a month. They have implemented a creative publicity among the groups (hanging banners with the committee contact information) There is also a traditional dinner with artistic shows taking place once a year to raise funds.

It is sort of the Delegate Dream Team and the region reaps the benefits.

What else has worked well has been the improved line of communication from WB to RD through mailings, email, the conference web site, and NAWS NEWS. The effort to teach RCMs and others how to conduct small group/large group discussion workshops has worked well so that the ASCs can now conduct their own CAR and other service workshops more productively.

By attending and representing my region as an RD at various service functions, I've gained a wide array of personal growth. Meeting, speaking to and working with members from other Regions around the world has opened new lines of communication and a variety of other resources to draw from.

Challenges

It has been a challenge in getting information about the work of World Services back to the home group members. It seems that even making reports both orally and printed still don't reach the groups until it's too late or there is some controversial issue to buzz about. The communication breakdown is obviously happening, but it seems harder to pinpoint where it happens.

Making the time to attend all the functions is also a strain. Monthly RSC meetings, CAR workshops, Regional Assembly, Service workshops such as MRLCNA and MRLE, Zonal Forum, visits to ASCs, the WSC, and then writing comprehensive reports about these events, in addition to recovery meetings and the home group business meeting, all add up to a lot of time to put in. Another challenge is fighting the constant flow of misinformation about what NAWS is and does and why "they do what they do".

Sometimes it can be frustrating job to inspire the participation of other NA members to do World Service business, but never giving up is crucial to succeeding. Usually, at this level of service, I've found dealing with the multitudes of personalities is a bit easier. Generally, NA members have more clean time, have worked steps and embrace a higher level of maturity and recovery. In the end, it is important to remember to be humble and participate in selfless service.

REPORT FROM THE FRENCH REGION WSC 27 April – 4 May 2008

The French region greets you. We have 4 Areas: Paris east, Paris west, Marseille (south) and Nantes (west) with 83 meetings – 44 in Paris and around Paris, 3 in the north, 2 in the east (Montbeliard), 17 in the south area, 16 in the west of France and one in Thaiti.

2007 was a very good year for us in terms of communication.

We are starting to talk in group level about 7th tradition, violence at meetings, lack of service... and taking time to discuss those issues at service meetings, starting with a moment of meditation and a reminder of our primary purpose.

RD Alternate service position filled by an addict from Marseille.

Service workshops were held by regional delegates.

The workshop held by Naws in Paris as well as the workshops held by the delegates encouraged members to get involved in service.

The 2 world service workshops brought together about 100 participants in Paris and others in Marseille. Those workshops included information about the area planning tool and other service topics.

We have in process the translation into French of Naws service pamphlets addressing issues that currently affect NA France.

An accountant has been hired to assist with the treasury.

We still have a lack of servants at the region level.

Outreach committee has initiated « twinning » between Parisian groups and other areas groups. It works.

Public Information is making a good work. They are beginning to put a 3 years plan in action.

Participation in a CNRS (National Center of Research and Science) study on addiction.

Annual forum at the convention to build a relationship with professionals. Attendance was lower than expected .We don't have a successful media strategy yet.

A service magazine has been created on internet.

We are very happy to come from Budapest with a bid for the 2009 winter's EDM in the southern area, Aix en Provence.

We attended a probation officer convention in Bloomington/Normal, IL. It was a three day event, and we had a booth setup for the duration. We looked very professional because we had a ton of material from NAWS delivered beforehand. The probation officers were grateful for the material and impressed by the quality of literature and information we provided them. It was a huge success for NA as a whole.

Our Regional phoneline has been a success and serves all Areas in the Region. The Region pays a flat rate of \$200 every month for a live person to answer the phones, and then call out to addicts if a caller needs to speak to an addict. This is much more economical than each area paying for their own phoneline and it is an 800-NUMBER covering our larger geographic areas.

We have a regional 800 number and it frees up local Area PI to perform more hands on activities, rather than dealing with a helpline. Each Area has a Point of Contact to update the call out sheet for the telephone operators. This is done via email and can be swiftly updated. We also update the meeting list with the operators so they can give out directions to meetings if need be.

Yes, however attendance was lower than expected. However, we have created a nice online web form for getting feedback from all groups and areas within our region and have sponsored area CAR workshops as well. We hope the online form will help assist us in getting greater feedback for the upcoming WSC.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts?

We experienced a marked lack of attendance by GSRs in our Region.

Has the number of members in your region been growing, shrinking, or staying the same since WSC 2006?

Some Areas have experienced increased growth while others stayed the same.

Innovations and Challenges

What subject generated the most interest and discussion in your region over the past conference cycle?

We had many discussions pertaining to the service support at the Group, Area and Regional level. We also discussed conventions at length in our Regional service meetings. Please share some solutions to challenges your region has faced since WSC 2006.

We had the problem of filling prudent reserves at the Regional level. We fell way below reserves frequently, because we had relied on convention income to boost our reserves. This past conference cycle, we lowered our reserves to better reflect the cost of certain items. We have also started to watch our expenditures more closely.

In addition, we have worked hard to educate new members to our service structure. We take time out at the opening of Regional/Area meetings to orientate those new to the business meeting. This takes away the barrier for most newcomers. We explain how our region works and make the newcomer feel comfortable participating in the discussions.

Please share some highlights or successes your region has experienced since WSC 2006.

We have been able to donate to NAWS! After our recent March 2008 meeting we were able to donate \$2473.38 to NAWS and \$500 to the MZF for the first time most of us can remember. We hope this is future trend for our RSC:-).

We also had good success with our website. It is highly interactive, with forums and a content management back-end so designated members in the Region can update flyers and other events to the site. We also used the site to tabulate votes on the motions for the WSC from any group within our region.

What additional information would you like to share with other conference participants? The Greater Illinois Region meets quarterly on a rotation basis. This past March was our final meeting before the WSC. We discussed the CAR report at length, our convention results, and minor business items. Questions were posed to the MZF – what does the MZF actually do and how are their funds used?

The MZF met at GIRCNA XI in Bloomington. The convention was a tremendous success. We brought in well over the amount we expected. This allowed our Region to donate to NAWS for the first time in a long time. Our planning committee is already underway with next year's convention being hosted in Springfield, IL. More will be revealed on that. We look forward to working closely with the MZF on making better use of local and regional resources to better serve our fellowship and NA as a whole.

Subject: Report to the World Conference

In the spirit of service to our Higher Power and the fellowship of Narcotics Anonymous, we bring you greetings and blessings from the Greater Philadelphia Region to the WSC 2008! To easily disseminate all the information in this report, we modeled it after the suggested report form for WSC 2008. We hope our fellow conference participants can share with us their experience with the various challenges facing our region.

Greater Philadelphia Region

Earl W. is our Regional Delegate and Paula B. is the Regional Delegate Alternate. This is our first Conference as the delegation. Currently, there are eleven areas and approximately two-hundred and fifty groups in our region. There are three-hundred and ten meetings a week. We have ninety-four H&I panels each week.

Donations and Literature

Donations from our Areas and Groups totaled \$22,693.42. Net revenue from our 2007 Regional Convention totaled \$32,919.16. Additional fundraisers and miscellaneous donations totaled \$5,493.50, giving our RSC total gross revenue of \$55,612.58. Our RSO, where our region primarily purchases literature, grossed \$131,169.74. Our RSC expenses were \$45,531.72 and RSO expenses totaled \$172,354.87. This gave our region a total net loss of \$31,104.27. We currently contribute approximately \$4,000.00 annually to H&I.

Our Service Structure

The Greater Philadelphia Region is an active participant in the autonomy zonal forum. We have a regional office incorporated in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit corporation with tax exempt, duty free status and host an annual convention with an average attendance of 3500 to 4000. None of our areas currently holds their own convention. We currently carry a comprehensive insurance policy covering our RSO, RSC, D&O, groups, areas, events, and our convention.

During this conference cycle, we held workshops about the issue discussion topics at our regional convention, the zonal forum hosted in our region, at our regional assembly. Most of these workshops have been panel discussions or small group. These discussions produced valuable information helping us plan services and assisting our groups in carrying the message. They will be discussed again at our next convention and at our CAR workshops. We hope to bring a synopsis of all our discussions to larger discussion at the conference.

Our public relations efforts over the last cycle included PSAs on mass transit, radio, and public bulletin boards. We have completely redesigned our website, naworks.org, and further publicized our phoneline, (215) NA-WORKS. We are also focusing on assisting our groups and H&I committees with negotiating facility agreements. We are in the process of negotiating with a new service provider for our regional

phoneline. Currently, we have a system that allows a caller to talk to a recovering addict 24 hours a day, seven day a week. The goal of the new provider is to take our current system to the next level at a substantial savings. All these efforts have culminated in a substantial growth in our membership.

By the time this report is published, we will have conducted several CAR workshops focusing on both the motions and the discussion topics.

Innovations and Challenges

The subject that seems to generate the most interest and discussion has been the financial and spiritual state of our region (i.e. the lack of donations and lack of members in service). Our biggest challenges were our outstanding literature debt, the high cost of our insurance and phoneline, an increasingly expensive RSO, a reduced WSO discount, a lack of legal representation and a lack of members in service.

We have made a considerable effort at solving these problems. We extensively fundraised to pay off our back debt to world, negotiated for a higher discount rate, moved our RSO a cheaper location, and hired a new attorney that specialized in nonprofits. As we stated earlier, we are working with a new phoneline provider to design a better system at approximately half the current cost. We are also shopping for competitive rate for our insurance. We conducted a bottom-up review of the entire organization to reduce expenses. The trusted servants of our RSC increased their presence at our member ASCs, subcommittees, events and homegroup business meetings.

Despite the challenges, we have had some successes. Our attendance and net revenue from regional convention increased dramatically. Attendance at our workshops has also increased. The zonal forum hosted by our region was the largest attended Autonomy Zonal Forum in the history of the zone. We successfully produced a multiregional meeting list in concert with the Eastern PA Region. Some of our homegroups started Twelve Concept Meetings. We also had a very successful Bilingual Speaker Jam aimed at building a relationship between a fast growing Spanish speaking fellowship and the wider English speaking fellowship within our region. We were also able to connect these members with other Spanish meetings outside of our region. These relationships are being carefully and successfully nurtured.

Conference Input

There are several issues and concerns for the WSC. The first one is how the WSO ship there literature to the RSOs. Another question was raised how the WSO can support Areas and/or Regions when homegroups buy directly from WSO instead of their RSO. Lastly we need input on how to handle other programs using the NA name.

Delegate Experience

While this may be our new delegates' first conference, they have wide range of service experience in many levels of service. Earl is a past co-chair of the regional convention committee, served as an RCM and is heavily involved in the operation of our phoneline. Paula is our past regional H&I chair, served on the executive committee of our region's 50th NA birthday celebration, served as an Area Secretary and H&I Chair. Our success so far has been our involvement in the Zonal Forum and the increase in our member interest in the service structure. Our greatest challenges have probably been in translating this interest in to commitment to getting in service.

The Guatemala NA Magazine is not being published presently because of lack of trusted servants.

Presently we have a web page and it has updated information about the groups and relevant matters of our fellowship.

We have participated in PI efforts in schools and last year we did a PI event in a detention center.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts?

The helpline has not worked well for us because we use a cell phone and the member in charge doesn't keep a record of the incoming calls. The phone was stolen in one occasion and later on the cell phone lost its configuration. We are presently planning to purchase a system that can handle several calls and also provide information about the NA program, provide group addresses and forward the callers to a helpline

We have focused our CAR workshops on dialogue and exchange, and have found that "sidebars" in discussion with area-level members often yield extremely valuable observations on problems being faced in fellowship development.

- 1. Service structure and leadership development is an area of importance and concern, as all of our areas are experiencing difficulty with attracting, nurturing, and keeping members in service. It is not uncommon for positions to remain unfilled, and memb Please share some solutions to challenges your region has faced since WSC 2006.
 - 1. There is a challenge in fostering the metamorphosis of a "12-step" or generic community of recovery, to a distinct NA fellowship. A) In 2007, the Hawaii Regional Convention was held in Makaha, far from the airport and the visitor amenities of Waikiki. The relocation was intentional, as it placed the event in proximity to the geographic area of greatest growth in the fellowship the leeward coast of Oahu. B) What has been key to this effort has been a consciousness of the situation by older members in the fellowship, and an active and ongoing mentoring of new members in service.
 - 2. The cost of travel between islands has fluctuated dramatically, and wise use of fellowship funds is always a concern. A) The Region established business accounts with interisland airlines, to assure that travel arrangements are cost effective. B) A consensus was taken of areas, and the fellowship at large verbalized its preference to continue with rotating the quarterly Regional meetings between islands, over holding all meetings on Oahu (cheapest to get to/from).
 - 3. Effective communication between trusted servants is now facilitated by use of online discussion boards, which has gained broad acceptance and usage by various service bodies within the fellowship.
 - 4. After many years, the issue of incorporation and non-profit status is reaching resolution.

Please share some highlights or successes your region has experienced since WSC 2006.

- 1. The annual Maui Gathering was held in 2007 on the island of Molokai. It was the first time that an NA event was held on the island, and the realization of an idea that was initially discussed in 2003. Molokai has a population of approximately 7,500, and two weekly NA meetings.
- 2. As appropriate, the Regional service body now utilizes consensus-based decision making in the way it does business.

What additional information would you like to share with other conference participants? The Hawaii Region has a strong commitment and connection to NA in the Asia and Pacific, and a focus on the growth of the fellowship that is global.

What has worked well is having access to a wealth of experienced members and service mentors. Everything I know, I have been fortunate enough to learn from others. There has also been the benefit of working this year with an Alternate Delegate (Sharon Q) that is a seasoned veteran of regional service, and attended WSC 2004.

The biggest challenge has been in wanting to have a steeper learning curve. The term of Hawaii Regional Delegate is two-years, or one WSC cycle, and I definitely wanted to get more accomplished before the end of my term.

Hungarian report for WSC, 2008

The Hungarian fellowship consists of approx. 100 members. In Hungary NA started in 1996. Since then so many things have happened!!!

After years of debate, we finally have a translation for Narcotics Anonymous (Nevtelen Drogfuggok). We decided that we use this only if we appear on the media, and if we hold presentations for professionals to avoid them translating our name as they wish. We use Narcotics Anonymous in our literature, and we use the NA abbreviation.

Groups and meetings: 17 groups, 20 meetings

- Pecs area (Southwest-Pecs+Komlo);7 groups, 10 meetings
- Budapest; 7 groups 7 meetings
- Szeged (Southeast);1 group 1 meeting
- Debrecen (Northeast); 1 group, 1 meeting
- Miskolc (Northeast); 1 new group, 1 meeting

We started participating at the EDM in 2006 and since then we've been attending regularly. We've received a lot of help from WSO and the EDM, which helped us in creating our service structure and many other things.

Service Structure:

We have one area; Pecs. All GSRs meet regularly to discuss regional issues at the Regional Assembly. Regional commitments: RD, at the moment we have no alternate, treasurer, and instead of the steering committee, we've elected a regional coordinator, who summarizes the Regional Assemblies, holds the GSRs together, and organizes the regional service meetings. Besides these our LTC works on a regional level.

H&I, PI:

We don't have H&I, PI committees, we carry this work out on a regional or group level. We regularly go to one prison, 12step and non-12step rehabs, hospitals and other institutions. We try to build good relationships where we are, and we are striving to carry the message to more places where we are not known.

Presentations:

As a result of the things learnt during an EDM FD visit to us, we hold more and more presentations, and we get more and more experience on how to do it.

Probation office:

The probation offices are open to the Chit system to verify attendance at meetings. We have a good relationship with them. We asked the groups whether they would be open to meeting attendance cards, and many groups said yes. We are continuously liaising with the probation offices. We haven't decided yet on how to verify attendance, but we would like to have the same system in the whole region.

Web page:

<u>www.na.info.hu</u> Our meeting list is regularly updated, and we update information about our conventions.

Phone line:

We have a regional phone line and there is a phone line in the Pecs area.

Literature:

The LTC revised the "Information about NA" and IP1. Now our goal is to revise more translations so that we can have more approved literature. At the same time the fellowship feels a great need for the translation of literature about service, as we don't have much. WSO offered us help to do it...

News Letter Sub-Committee report

This committee started its activity with 5.000 copies of each issue at the first couple of season, and has increased to 45,000 copies of each issue at the present. We have had a close cooperation with De J. the editor of NA Way and have learned a lot from her. Also few of our articles have been reprinted in NA Way.

This News letter has also had a positive impact in Prisons and Re-Hab centers, and some of our members have received the message of recovery through this News letter.

Workshop Sub-Committee report

This committee has held 66 workshops during its term of activity. Which are as follow:

- 10 Workshops for 7th Tradition, Literature, 12 Concepts.
- 9 Workshops for Area Planning.
- 20 Panels of O&A
- 17 Workshops for special issues and problems of the different Areas.
- 10 different Workshops upon request of the Areas.

The average of members attending each workshop was 150 which total to about 10,000 members. The overall cost was about \$8510 we are planning to focus on Training workshops for the future term.

Regional Office report

In the first year of activity due to lack of experience and improper management system we had an unfortunate case of embezzlement of about \$ 12765 which was of course reimbursed anonymously by some members

After this incident it was decided that we change management and update our systems and software, things are much better now and are improving.

At the present there is a Manager and 4 other employees running the office. We have 14 Telephone lines and have a monthly turn over of \$ 211700.

In the past 9 months we have bought from NAWS office branch in Iran and distribute among Groups: 492843 copies of different NA books, 1598227 copies of different IP's, 823771 pieces of Key Tags, 64859 pieces of Medallions, 124248 copies of our Local Newsletter and 46500 copies of NA Way translated by NAWS office in Iran.

Legal Registration Ad-Hoc Committee

The work of this committee was finished last year and NA was registered by the number of 21065 as per the Iranian Law.

This was a great accomplishment as now we can deal with Government and different Organizations much easier and as a result our Groups can obtain meeting spaces without any problem.

LTC Report

This committee consists of 7 members and holds 2 meetings each week. The Sponsorship book was translated last year and now is being printed and distributed among the Groups by NAWS-Iran. At the present we are working on Public Relation handbook and the new 4 IP's: Group Business Meetings, Disruptive & Violent Behavior, Roles & Responsibilities, and NA Groups & Medication.

This committee holds monthly meetings and workshops for the H&I Chairs of the 10 Areas. At the present we are sending panels to 130 Prisons, Hospitals, DIC and Re-Hab centers. Also 250 weekly meetings are held in different institutes. There are a total of 2600 members active in H&I committee all over Iran.

Due to tremendous request for services in Iran Region and also big turn over of funds, a committee was formed to hold Regional and Area planning and budgeting workshops. Which recently the first one was held at the Regional level and the result was over whelming

PI Sub-Committee Report

In the past 2 years we have focused on 3 different aspects in our PI activities. PI activities for Government officials and Society at large, holding workshops for member of PI committee from all over the country, and PI stalls in Seminars. We have a total of 1500 to 1600 members active in PI committees all over Iran.

In the past year we held 20 workshops for members active in PI committee and the average of attendance in each workshop was about 200 members.

We are now trying to familiarize our members with the new Public Relation Handbook and we are planning to gradually shift from PI to PR.

The workshop was divided into six small groups, each group consisting of nine persons who discussed "wants" and "needs".

It was explained that the secret of NA´S success <u>lies in our wants</u> (5th tradition)

In order to get our wants, we have lots of needs that have to be fulfilled.

The workshop continued by taking area inventories as suggested in area planning tool. The questionnaire had been distributed among area servants 3 months earlier.

Then after reviewing the results of the inventory from all the areas and taking them into consideration. Each of the six groups started to analyze current affairs and the problem of the local fellowship and look in to future and the challenges ahead. Let's hope that before we face these problems we would be able to prevent them in order that the massage of recovery will be carried better and on a winder scale. By way of taking inventory, based on the numbers and marks, the problems were discussed on a larger scale, and then they were divided into four groups.

COMMON PROBLEMS

- A) Not having a proper guideline
 - 2. Not having paper voting procedure.
 - 3. Lack of transparent reports
 - 4. Not having a clear delegation of responsibilities to trusted servants.
 - 5. Lack of rotation of service responsibilities
- B) Not having a continuous training program
 - 2. Lack of knowledge among trusted servants.
- C) Lack of budgeting.
 - 2. Bringing financial problems into areas.
 - 3. Not enough support for the regional service committee through the seventh tradition.

- D) Defining the levels of service structure
 - 2. Not having a uniformed service structure across Iran.
 - 3. Not having clear Guideline for service.
 - 4. Lack of proportion for boundaries
 - 5. Not having regional assembly.
 - 6. Not having a format.
 - 7. Too much service load for the regional committee
 - 8. Reviewing the service structure.
 - 9. Revising geographical Boundaries of the areas. After the completion of this section, the groups started to set yearly goals.

First priority: TRAINING GOALS

2nd priority: GOALS FOR "SERVICE GUIDELINES" AND" VOTING"

3rd priority: <u>STRUCTURAL GOALS.</u>

4th priority: SEVENTH TRADITION AND ELEVENTH CONCEPT.

- Setting annual goals and plans, also supplying training necessities, and electing trainers.
- Having a defined program and time- table for related committees (workshops)

Methods of reaching goals for guidelines and voting

- Reviewing and revising of the guidelines for sub- committees.
- Organizing a special committee for service "structure"; using the experience of our areas; to familiarize members with traditions and service concepts.
- Establishing a temporary & specialized committee, using all internal and external resources.
- Writing a guideline for sub- committees
- Preparing a comprehensive guideline.
- Training trusted servants and preparing a booklet of guide lines for service structure for Narcotics Anonymous in Iran.

Methods of reaching Structural Goals

- Evaluation and distribution for planning and goal- orientation based on needs.
- Establishing an AD- HOC committee to review the structure and removing the obstacles.

- Having regular training workshops and preparing service booklets.
- Time- table for the above
- Organizing a committee to review the service structure.
- Organizing area and regional assemblies to give guidance about service structure and training structure in order to promote area growth & independence.

Goals for 7th Tradition and 11th Concept

- Using "Payam Behboodi Magazine" (Iran local news letter) NA members to support the seventh tradition and to train the trusted servants how to handle NA funds with responsibility.
- To organize training workshops in this regard.
- Budgeting for the committees and the areas.
- To invite more experienced members to workshops and using them in sub-committees.
- Transparent reporting of the financial expenditure and spending the funds in a responsible way
- Continuing the activities of the planning & budge ting committee with regards to the importance of the seventh tradition and the eleventh concept in "structure"
- Increasing the level of knowledge among members in regards in to proper use of NA resources through training workshops and dispatch of speakers.
- Planning and budgeting of the committees; transparency in financial reports; and organizing various workshops.

At the end of this Workshop 4 Trusted Servants were elected in order to form 4 work groups to review and come up with approaches for these goals and present the outcome to the Region in 3 months.

We asked for the NA phone number and regional website address to be broadcast at the end of two different TV programs about cocaine use in Ireland, which were shown on the national TV station. This led to several PR opportunities, with several positive media reports about NA taking place in different parts of the country. We also attended a courtesy meeting with the Board of Directors of A.A. in Ireland to discuss any issues of mutual concern. This is likely to become a yearly event. We have two new Area websites up and running, in the Southern and Eastern Areas.

We have a central information line with a recorded announcement that gives the numbers for the four Area helplines and the Regional website address. Phone Lines are working well, and in December there were a total of 124 calls between the different Area's lines.

Phone line workshops were held in the last year in two of the areas. Volunteer training and role plays were found to be very helpful.

2008 January

Lithuanian NA was set up in 1991. This year will be 16 years anniversary of Lithuanian NA. Now there are 9 NA groups in Lithuania region. We have 23 meetings per week. There were opened a two new NA groups – one in Vilnius "Tik šiandien" and other – the closed group in Alytus, in men prison. Lithuanian Fellowship holds about 300- 500 members.

Lithuania is a region. Regional Committee meets 4 times a year. Once a year there is annual meeting of regional Committees – Assembly. There are 18 trusting servants in Lithuanian Regional Service committee (2007 12 09 information). This year there will be rotation almost in all services positions (except few).

Area 2 in Helena hosted a regional workshop on Building Strong Home Groups. Again people enjoyed learning more about the process. We came up with some 'low hanging fruit.'

Area 5 in Kalispell hosted a regional workshop on Building Strong Home Groups during a weekend birthday celebration of the Recovery Group. There was a lot of enthusiam and many good ideas generated along with an action plan.

We had a booth at a convention of corrections professionals in Missoula, MT. One attendee commented that we were the only entity there that wasn't selling something. We were surrounded by surveilance equupment, stun guns and more. We spoke to staff from the women's prison in Billings about their new facility that allows women to live and learn new employment skills in a lower security setting. They were enthusiastic about the prospect of local NA H&I efforts in the new facility.

In Helena and Missoula we have been presenting to pre-release staff. We discussed our position with court cards which is that we sign them for the member who asks us--not for the facility. By signing we do not guarantee the person whose card we signed attended the meeting. We let the pre-release population know the same. We try to stress we are not part of their punishment.

In Helena we presented to state probation and parole professionals. There seemed to be some enthusiams generated for sending folks to our meetings.

We are printing and providing more statewide meeting lists to various institutions around the state.

We have a statewide helpline at 800-990-6262 with 2 cell phones each in three areas rotating answering duties every two weeks. These phones are answered by trained recovering addicts who are members of the area phoneline committees. It has been working well with nearly 100 percent of calls being answered. Our calls go through an internet provider called Ring Central. Recently we are re-evaluating and re-energizing the project. We will add to the guidelines now that that we have a couple of years of experience with the helpline up and running.

We were fortunate to host the Rocky Mountain Forum CAR workshop in Helena, MT this past December. We focused on the discussion questions and various motions.

MOUNTANEER REGION REPORT

The Mountaineer Region encompasses a sparsely populated area located in the heart of Appalachia. Our region includes most of West Virginia plus some meetings along the border of Ohio and Maryland. We currently have over 125 meetings a week and our regional service committee is over 20 years old.

Two of our most successful service efforts are our phoneline and our convention. Our phoneline service consists of an 800 number, a live answering service, and pagers. Our toll free number rings at an answering service in Charleston, WV. The answering service can give out meeting information for our region, or the service can page an addict to return the call of the original caller. We have five pagers — one for our phoneline chair and the other four carried by phoneline volunteers. Most of the funds to pay for this service are raised by our convention subcommittee.

We hold two conventions a year in Mountaineer – one in the spring and one in the fall. Both are held at what could be best described as a convention campus owned by the state dept. of education in Ripley, WV. Attendance is around 400-500 addicts at each convention. The convention subcommittee is a subcommittee of the Mountaineer and meets quarterly at regional service. All funds for the convention and produced by the convention go through the regional bank account. Funds are raised by a registration fee and the sale of merchandise. All money raised goes to fund services.

After hearing too many horror stories, the Mountaineer Region has purchased liability insurance. Our policy covers all regional meetings and events as well as every meeting in our region. We thought this step prudent.

We face many challenges in Mountaineer not the least of which is our limited human resources. There just aren't that many of us and we are spread thin. Nonetheless, things are going well for us, and we are grateful for the chance to serve.

NJRSC Regional Report to WSC 2008

The New Jersey Regional Service Conference was formed on September 30, 1984. The Northern New Jersey Region split from the NJRSC in 1989 to form a Regional Service Conference for the northern most Jersey counties. A Shared Services Agreement has been in affect since the splitting of New Jersey into two separate regions. This "Shared Services," manages the New Jersey Helpline, publication of the New Jersey Statewide Meeting Directory and the New Jersey Website. Each region pays their fair share of the expenses.

We have a state-of-the-art 800 number/helpline that is part of a "Shared Service" with the Northern New Jersey Region. This is a cost of about \$12,000 to \$13,000 yearly. In 2006 we had 21,480 calls and in 2007 we had 19,305.

Also, as part of our Shared Services with the Northern New Jersey we have a website, www.nanj.org, which ultimately has helped to keep the cost of our phone services down and get out information on meetings, activities, and service related information. We had 51,356 visits on our website in 2006.

Regional Information:

The NJRSC is comprised of 10 Areas: Burlington, Cape-Atlantic, Capital, Central Jersey, Cumberland/Salem, Greater Atlantic City, Middlesex, Ocean, Northeast New Jersey, and South Jersey. NJRSC has approximately 390 meetings weekly, held in our member areas and approximately 126 H&I panels take place each week, throughout the 10 area H&I Subcommittees. The NJRSC meets bi-monthly on the odd numbered months, and is rotated and hosted throughout the by each different Area.

The NJRSC does host a Regional Convention on an annual basis. The Convention is managed by a private, non-profit 501 C3 New Jersey Regional Convention Corporation which has an 11 member Board of Directors. The regional convention is attended by an average of 800 addicts, as well as about 150 invited guests from rehab facilities throughout the region.

There are also four area conventions; three that meet on an annual basis and one that meets bi-annually, all with an average attendance of about 600-800 addicts.

The Region has held several Area Planning Tool workshops in three of our member areas. Some of the outcomes were GSR orientation guides, GSR Workshops, and a GSR buddy system.

Since the CAR's release, CAR Workshops were held to discuss the issues. In all, we held a Workshop for the Region, Two GSR Assemblies and several Workshops for individual Areas.

Zonal Membership

The New Jersey is proud to be a member region of the Northeast Zonal Forum.

Donations and Literature Distribution:

The NJRSC's total income in 2006 was \$48,540.38. Our total expenses were \$47,630.24, and we had \$6,900.00 in donations to NAWS. In 2007, the NJRSC's total income was \$52,053.02. Our total expenses were \$41,445.60 and we had \$13,700.00 in donations to NAWS.

Annual Literature Distribution:

NJRSC does not have a Regional Service Office nor a Literature Purchasing or Literature Distribution Committee. The 10 member areas are free to purchase literature from whomever they choose which is usually NAWS, Greater New York, or Greater Philadelphia. The only NJRSC literature project is our statewide meeting directory, which is a Shared Services project with Northern New Jersey. The most up to date meeting information is maintained on the New Jersey website.

The New Jersey Region obtained liability insurance through Vista Insurance. We have had this policy for over 2 years and coverage is for all the groups in our regions. We have an Insurance Liaison position in our region which is the single point of contact for the groups and insurance agency.

Our Regional Literature Review Committee has been meeting on a monthly basis for the past year. We are currently working on a Tradition Writing Project entitled, <u>Understanding the 12 Traditions of Narcotics Anonymous.</u> The Outline and the Introduction are posted on our Regional Website, <u>www.nanj.org</u>, and they are currently working on the 2nd Tradition.

A previous regional literature project entitled <u>Service</u> is also going to be reviewed and possibly resubmitted.

Our Public Information committee attended the Annual Probation Association of New Jersey, a Public Relations Event in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The event was well attended, along with the NA Booth.

The Northern California Region is made up of 21 areas, with 1400 meetings per week. Our Area H&I committees are covering approximately 330 facilities.

Donations and Literature

In our 2006-2007 fiscal year the NCRSC's expenses were \$62,862, with group and area donations of \$87,949

Most of our areas purchase their literature through our Regional Service Office

How much literature does the region distribute to H&I annually (in US dollars)? Your Regional Service Structure

The Northern California Region participates in the Western States Zonal Forum

The Northern California Regional Service Office (NCRSO) is a California 5013C corporation and has its office in Fairfield, California. Our office is staffed by two Special Workers and is overseen by a nine trusted servants that comprise its Board of Directors.

Does your region have a regional convention?

The Northern California Regional Convention (NCCNA) will be holding its thirtieth annual convention in March of 2008. Attendance at our Saturday Main Speaker Meeting averages 7000 members. Half of which are registered for the convention.

There are two area convention held in Northern California. The "These Areas Convention" (TAC) is an annual convention held by seven of our northern areas. The Monterey Bay Convention of Narcotics Anonymous (MBCNA) is a bi-annual event sponsored by two of our southern areas. These conventions average about 400-500 attendees. Neither of these conventions operates under a corporate structure and are not affiliated with the NCRSC.

If yes, did your regional corporation have to pay any taxes or duties last year? Do you have tax-exempt or duty-free status

Except for state sales tax neither our RSC or RSO had to pay any taxes.

Our RSC provides liability insurance for all of our meetings and many of our area events.

Has your region held discussions about any of the issue discussion topics over the past conference cycle?

Using the NAWS session profiles our RDs have conducted IDT workshops at a Regional Assembly, and at the first three, of six, CAR Assemblies.

What can you share about the type of workshop or your experience with these efforts?

Our regional PR Coordinators are involved in numerous PR presentations to professionals. In the past year presentations have been made to IN the last year we have done the following

California Convention of the California Association of Drug Court Professionals,

California Convention of the California Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors

California Convention of the California Office of Substance Abuse,

Grass Valley Drug Court as well as having a representative on the California Department of Corrections & Rehabilitation's 12 Step Advisory Committee.

All of our areas have helplines although our region does not. Our RSO has a system set up, whereby the areas can choose to run their system through our RSO. The RSO pays the bill and then passes the cost down to the participating areas. Many of our areas are dealing with the need to update their systems. As of yet no "one size fits all" system has been found.

Has your region hosted CAR workshops?

If yes, did you workshop the discussion questions in addition to the motions? Is there anything that you can share about your experience with these efforts?

At the writing of this report Northern California has held three CAR workshops. We will be conducting four more between now and the WSC, including—for the first time— an assembly at our regional convention

Our assemblies generally run between six and seven hours each, with the time split about 50/50 between the IDTs and business. One thing we've found is that if we cover all three IDTs plus the Targeted Literature and medallion issues, we don't have enough time to do a thorough job. So, what we've been doing is Who's Missing (we use this as a lead in to the Targeted Literature discussions) at every assembly and alternating the other two IDTs, so that everything gets covered at some assemblies. We are also providing a continental breakfast and a lunch at all of our assemblies. This not only keeps the attendees at the assemblies all day, but also allows us to work through lunch, so that we have more time to cover all of the issues.

Has the number of members in your region been growing, shrinking, or staying the same since WSC 2006?

Although the number of meetings in our region has remained stable we seem to be growing in membership; partly due to the influx of addicts being sent through the criminal justice system, as well as treatment facilities. Innovations and Challenges

What subject generated the most interest and discussion in your region over the past conference cycle?

How to fix our aging service structure has been the subject that has generated the most interest since the last conference.

Through much fellowship discussions and presentations by our RDs, I believe that most of our fellowship has come to realize that a minor tweaking of the service structure will not be enough to fix what ails us; and that major changes in the way we provide services are needed.

The main challenge to implementing a new service structure is the process itself. To do a proper job of evaluation and implementation an ASC workgroup needs at least a year of planning, and it's difficult to find the people who are willing to commit to the process. One of the results of this is that we have areas that are changing the name, but not the substance of how they provide services.

What our RDs have been doing is telling our areas to slow down and not be in a hurry. Right now we have two areas that are 6-8 months into the process. Both of these areas are taking the time to do a proper job, and are being helped by experienced members. The two committees are on slightly different tracts and the hope is, that once these areas implement new service models other areas will be able to learn from their successes and failures.

Please share some highlights or successes your region has experienced since WSC 2006.

Our 2007 convention set records for both attendance and profits.

A complete re-design of our website.

Our RSC has implemented a policy of following up our annual inventory with an annual planning session to implement solutions to the issues that are raised in the inventory. We are also partially

suspending business once each quarter, to do small group discussions and workshops, on pertinent issues.

Conference Input

Is there anything in particular you want to discuss at the conference?

The H&I Handbook is my hot topic. At the same time that we're talking about developing a bunch of new literature, the fact that the outdated H&I Handbook is one of the things that's holding back serious attempts to re-structure how we provide services, seems to be overlooked.

How and where NA provides H&I services has changed so much since the handbook was developed that it no longer reflects the realities of the fellowship. I would go as far as to say that this handbook is devolving from a tool into a weapon.

Delegate Experience

What has worked well and what challenges have you experienced in your role as regional delegate?

Our main challenge as delegates has been logistical. After years of our regional delegates telling our areas that we are here to help, they are finally taking us up on our offers. The time and travel our RDs are putting in is increasing drastically.

One of the things that has been working very well for us has been the use of Power Point presentations. Our RSC gave us the funds to purchase a projector, and it has been money well spent. Not only do these presentations hold the attention of the audience; they allow the delegates to present accurate—up to date—information, while limiting personal opinions until they are asked for.

WSC 2008 Regional Reports

Northern New England Region Report to the WSC 2008

Chris Raymond - Regional Delegate attended WSC 2004 and 2006 Jamie Emerson – Alternate Delegate attended WSC 1995, 1996 and 2006

Our region has 3 areas. The Granite State Area has 38 groups and 42 meetings, the Maine Area has 45 groups and 58 meetings and the Seacoast Area has 14 groups. This is a total of around 97 groups and about 114 meetings a week across Maine, New Hampshire and a tiny part of Northern Massachusetts. This is a slight decrease from our report 2 years ago. We represent addicts in the very northeast corner of the US. Our areas fulfill 21 H&I commitments each month.

In 2007, we received \$3208.52 in area donations and \$242.00 in group donations to our region. Our expenses were \$395.00 for rent, PO Box, minutes, and other miscellaneous expenses, \$1071.92 for RD and RD-A travel to zonal forums and expenses related to regional workshops, and \$1243.17 in donations to NAWS. We have a \$700 prudent reserve and set aside \$1750.00 for RD-A expenses to WSC 2008.

The RSC purchases service handbooks and the Conference Agenda Report directly from the WSO. We do not distribute any literature on the regional level, although two thirds of our areas buy and sell literature for their groups.

The Northern New England Region participates in the North East Zonal Forum. We have attended regularly since its inception and have been actively involved in its evolution as a zone. We see ourselves as partners with the other delegates from the zone and reap many benefits from discussing the many topics that come before us. It is also a great training ground for our delegates and really helps us to prepare for the upcoming WSC.

There is no service office in our region, and there is no regional convention. We do put on a Multi-Regional Learning Event (MRLE) that is attended by many delegates and others from the northeast US and beyond. It is a service and recovery weekend usually in early December of every odd number year. With the MRLE happening just after the CAR is released, very often, it is many delegates first workshop with participation from NAWS before the WSC. We had participation from over 35 addicts from 9 regions and NAWS at MRLE X (December 2007) and look forward to MRLE XI in December 2009.

The Granite State Area has a convention every other year with between 400 - 500 addicts in attendance. GSA also has a very popular campout every June. The Maine Area has two smaller weekend gatherings of addicts, including The Miracle (120 addicts) and the Winter Unity Fest (75 addicts). There is also a group sponsored campout in the Maine Area. The Seacoast Area has their own campout in July (75 addicts).

Our region has not incorporated, and does not enjoy tax-exempt status. However, the Granite State Area formed a 501C-3 corporation several years ago.

The NNERSC puts on semi regular (2-3 per year) Regional Workshops. At these workshops, and at open forum at our RSC, we have shared on the Issue Discussion Topics of Building Strong Home groups, and Who Is Missing From Our Meetings And Why? We have also had a NA History Workshop. Our experience with the workshops has been fairly positive, although attendance has been less than we had hoped for. We have found that having a workshop in each area, discussing things that are important to the local fellowship and having the local fellowship help select the topic and format for the day helps to build our relationship with the area, although it has been a struggle to get members interested. The delegates make themselves available to attend area and group workshops whenever possible. The CAR

Workshops do not usually bring in enough members to utilize the small group format, so we strive to have a very interactive session with those who are present, including discussing the CAT when time permits.

At this time, the NNERSC does not participate directly in Public Relations efforts, or have a regional help line number. We do have an online newsletter that is available by email subscription and is posted on our area websites. The Newsletter Committee meets primarily online and in private chat sessions to do its work.

The member areas provide Public Relations efforts, including Hospital & Institutions, Public Information and Phone lines. All three areas in our region have access to helpline numbers. The Maine Area has a statewide 800 number, and the Granite State and Seacoast Area share a helpline number although primarily the GSA maintains it. In the last year, the GSA is switched to a nation-wide toll free number. The Granite State and Maine Areas maintain websites that provide meeting and service committee information as well as upcoming events. The GSA website has online convention registration.

Since WSC 2006, the number of NA members seems to have increased slightly, although in the State of Maine, there has been a noticeable decrease in meetings, particularly in rural communities. The issue that has generated the most interest and discussion over the last conference cycle has definitely been Building Strong Home groups, although Who Is Missing From Our Meetings And Why gave some of our members' new ways to think about our potential members.

The NNERSC has continued to have some challenges. Because we are in such a large, mostly rural geographic region, some of our meetings are isolated with great distances between them. Communication with these rural meetings has improved, through email and phone contact, but remains inconsistent. The state of Maine is over 35,000 square miles and is comprised of only one Area. Another challenge has been limited participation at the RSC has affected our ability to take on new projects or do much long term planning.

As delegates, what has worked well has been getting information from NAWS through www.na.org NA News, NA Way, email and attending events with World Service presence. We have appreciated getting some information from the NAWS FTP site after the last WSC. Communicating with other delegates from the NEZF in between meetings has been a tremendous asset to us as well. As previously mentioned, Zonal Forum participation has helped us to prepare for the WSC. One of the ongoing challenges for us as delegates has been to make the large amount of information that is made available to us, useful to the member areas and groups. With information coming from several delivery systems including regional minutes, newsletter, email, NAWS News, NA Way, etc., it seems as though much of it gets filtered, watered down or lost by the time it gets to the ASC or group level.

One thing we would like to see discussed at the WSC is why some of the important things that are in the CAT are not discussed more openly before the Conference, such as the new proposed book length piece. At the WSC, there are many things in the CAT that we will be asked to vote on without the benefit of talking to our regions ahead of time.

We do look forward to the discussions planned for the future of Service Pamphlets.

The Ohio Region is an active participant in the Midwest Zonal Forum, but is investigating the possibility of joining another neighboring zonal forum.

About The Ohio Region

There are presently fourteen areas in the Ohio Region. The geographic area served by the Region is roughly two-thirds of the state of Ohio, plus portions of northern Kentucky.

In cooperation with the Buckeye Region, which serves the groups in northeastern Ohio, we conduct H&I Panels in several of the State's correctional facilities which are not reflected in the numbers above.

Annual Donations and Expenses

Total expenses for the Ohio Region in 2007 were \$9,619.48. The sum total of donations from groups and areas to the Region in 2007 was \$17,417.72. The cumulative total of donations from the Ohio Region to NAWS in 2007 was \$9,405.07.

Collectively, the areas within the Ohio Region distribute nearly \$15,000 (in US dollars) worth of NA literature to H&I efforts each year.

Literature Distribution

At the present time, the Ohio Region does not maintain & operate a regional service office. Groups and areas within our region purchase NA literature from a variety of sources, including NA World Services and other Ohio Region

regional service offices (RSO's). A few of our areas operate area service offices that make literature more readily available to local groups and members.

Regional Service Structure

The Ohio Regional Service Committee of Narcotics Anonymous is incorporated as a non-profit organization under the laws of the state of Ohio and, as such, is tax exempt.

Upon determining that a single H&I Coordinator was insufficient to achieve any real service delivery, the Ohio Region re-established a Regional Hospitals & Institutions Subcommittee in 2006. This subcommittee has helped areas to plan & facilitate local H&I Service Learning Days. Additionally, we have continued to host NA "Behind The Walls" Conventions in some of the State's correctional facilities.

Last year, the Ohio Region re-established a Regional Public Information Subcommittee to develop & coordinate P.I. activities for the Region and to assist areas in their P.I. efforts. This subcommittee is continuing work on a project to place billboards at various locations around the state. The billboard message highlights our Region's NA helpline and website and follows recommended Public Information guidelines. The effectiveness of these billboards has been evidenced by increased helpline & website activity after their posting.

We continue to cooperate with the Buckeye Region to host OCNA, the annual "Ohio Convention of Narcotics Anonymous". Areas within both regions take turns with the annual responsibilities for planning & hosting this statewide convention, which is traditionally held on the Memorial Day weekend (the last weekend of May). This year's convention (OCNA XXVI) is being hosted by the Greater Cincinnati Area, a member of the Ohio Region, and will be held in Covington, KY on May 23rd, 24th & 25th. Average attendance at this event is app. 700. In an effort to improve the consistency of this event, our two regions formed the Ohio Convention of Narcotics Anonymous, Inc., a non-profit corporation with a Board of Advisors to serve in an oversight & support capacity for each year's convention committee and serve as a liaison between these committees and both RSC's.

Four areas within the Ohio Region host area conventions, as follows:

- COACNA "Central Ohio Area Convention of NA" typically held on the first full weekend in January each year average attendance is over 1,000;
- DACNA "Dayton Area Convention of NA" typically held on the fourth weekend of July every other year average attendance is around 650;
- GCACNA "Greater Cincinnati Area Convention of NA" held on the weekend following Thanksgiving each year average attendance is around 1,000; and
- TACNA "Toledo Area Convention of NA" typically held on the second full weekend in February each year average attendance is over 500.

The Ohio Region hosts an annual "12-Step Spiritual Retreat" on the second full weekend in October. This year's (the 21st Annual) retreat will be held at Tar Hollow State Park, east of Chillicothe, OH, on October 10th, 11th & 12th. Last year, app. 350 addicts were registered for this event, nearly 800 addicts attended the Saturday night speaker meeting, and attendance continues to grow larger each year.

On May 9th, 10th & 11th, the Ohio Region will host its "first ever" Spring Retreat at this same location. We have been on a waiting list to secure a Spring weekend at this facility for nearly two decades, and we were finally given the opportunity to reserve the site for the second full weekend in May. If all goes well, this may become another annual event.

Our Region operates a toll-free NA helpline, the Ohio Info-Line, (1-800-587-4232). Calls are answered by a professional answering service that can provide the caller with information on local NA meetings and/or refer the caller to any one of six area-operated hotlines for further help. In some cases, the answering service refers messages to NA members serving as contacts for more specific information. According to the most recent reporting, our helpline is receiving around 150 calls per month. We are extremely fortunate to be served by Ohio Region

an answering service whose staff has learned and respect our Traditions (to the best of their ability). They are timely in their response to calls.

Also, the Ohio Region maintains a website (www.naohio.org) which provides contact information for each of the local Areas as well as for the Region (plus similar area & regional contact information for the Buckeye Region), internet access to NA meeting & activity information for the entire state (along with interactive mapping links for each meeting or event), direct links to the NA literature made available on the NA World Services website, and links to other NA-related websites. At last report, this website is receiving around 5,000 "visits" per month, and continues to exhibit increased interest & usage by NA members, professionals in the treatment of addictions, and other concerned individuals.

Innovations and Challenges

Since WSC 2006, the Ohio Region has shown continuous growth in the number of NA members, meetings, groups & areas.

Probably the greatest challenge we still face is attracting NA members to become (and remain) actively involved in service work. This is evidenced by vacant trusted servant positions and under-manned subcommittees, resulting in inactive subcommittees and inadequate or non-existent services. We have made some progress, but we still have much more to do.

On December 15th, the Ohio Region conducted an initial *CAR* workshop, and our Delegate Team attended the Multi-Regional *CAR* Workshop, hosted by the Michigan Region in conjunction with the quarterly meeting of the Midwest Zonal Forum on February 2nd & 3rd. Many areas within our Region have already hosted local workshops on the Issue Discussion Topics (IDT's) and Areas have been encouraged and have begun to host follow-up *CAR/CAT* Workshops prior to our next RSC meeting in early April.

Our regional phoneline is housed at our RSO and manned by Live addicts. We have shifts from 8a.m. until 10 p.m. afterward we have an answering voicemail which directs an addict to a helpline which we can answer after hours. Our North County Inland and North Coastal areas have joined to co-host a phoneline which is computer generated to the phone worker homes during their shift. All very well organized and successful. We are proud.

The North Coastal and North County Inland areas are co-hosting a phoneline. Still in its infancy yet it seems very successful. But it has provided us the opportunity to have two phoneline services within our Region.

If yes, did you workshop the discussion questions in addition to the motions?

We had workshopped the IDT questions prior to the CAR back in August 2007. Our CAR workshops were more information gathering than a workshop per say.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts?

We need more interested addicts to be involved in these topics and service related workshops. We feel that we had successful turnouts, I would feel better if more addicts were involved.

presentation we lost half the members when we suggested that they form small groups to workshop the discussion topics. Those that received the worksheets were really motivated once they got going and we got good feedback.

What can you share about the different types of efforts in which your region participated, or about your experience with these efforts? Region has produced posters for all areas to leverage economies of scale. Garden Route Area has had very positive interactions with Community Policing Forum and SOS Community Youth Project (New Youth IP provided and used as a basis for their meetings). NA SA Website indentified as a useful resource. Gauteng Area has spearheaded the production and placement of Radio PSAs for all Areas and all areas have made good progress with media campaigns in web, print and outdoor mediums, at least 5000 posters have been put up. Western Cape Area had talks at University of Cape Town, professionals and students and intends to extend these efforts to other tertiary education facilities. Schools campaign; database created of all the schools in the Western Cape, started to make contact. NA website linked to the schools tertiary site. Attended numerous presentations ranging from symposiums on drug abuse, municipal meetings and religious groups.

All efforts have been productive and positive.

Does the region have any type of NA phoneline or a helpline? Yes. Each Area has a Phoneline and we instituted a National Helpline (an IVR system) this year.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts? National phoneline has been a significant expense and a very challenging project technically. It is now fully implemented and has allowed us to track calls more effectively. We have been surprised by the high percentages of dropped calls (hang ups) (30%) and calls from "Friends & Family" (37%). GR Phoneline is experiencing a steady increase in volumes. We have had difficulties of late with general power cuts that have resulted in the failure of the server that hosts the phone line. We have recorded a message to be played in this event referring the addicts to an alternate number. Note that neither the National nor the Area phonelines are manned (at this stage) but refer callers to the website and to the numbers of Phoneline service members. The primary advantage of the National Phoneline is that we have a single number for NA South Africa which facilitates National promotion for all Areas. The number has enabled smaller areas and orphan areas to offer a helpline service.

Do all areas have their own phoneline or helpline? Yes, in addition to the National line (which refers callers to addicts in the relevant Area, including "orphan" areas). Each area is retaining its own phoneline until the Areas are satisfied that the number can be phased out.

What can you share about your experience with these efforts? With the exception of better tracking through the National number the experience is the same; the same service members respond to both Area and National helpline calls in the same way. The service meets the current need. On a personal level phoneline service is extremely rewarding as the first member to have contact with a still suffering addict and to have the responsibility of so many 12 step calls.

UKPI regularly attends 4 - 6 national profile conferences for professionals who have contact with addicts. We run a booth and answer questions. We have recently been asked to present at some of these, and are developing good working relationships with key "audiences", in line with NAs' PR mission.

We have a UK National Helpline with a new unique number: 0845 FREEDOM (3733366). We have also rolled out 'Helpline from Home', a system that allows us to redirect the

national helpline to member's landlines to enable us to provide a 24hr service.

Some area phonelines have closed and they are holding training for the 'Helpline from Home' scheme as this does not restrict the National Helpline to people living in London.

Has your region hosted *CAR* workshops? **Yes we have held some, but not as many as expected.**

If yes, did you workshop the discussion questions in addition to the motions?

No we did those separately.

Is there anything that you can share about your experience with these efforts?

The 'Sponsorship Book' was either not heard of or felt it was too anecdotal with a lot of content that was very long-winded. One Area thought it was a good discussion question as it raised an awareness about the book. Another Area thought more targeted literature for Newcomers on drug replacement programmes would be productive.

Innovations and Challenges

What subject generated the most interest and discussion in your region over the past conference cycle?

We have tried to generate more discussions on the flow of funds within our Region. Creating an awareness of where money goes has been paramount, providing RCM's with documentation to take back to their Areas for debate. This has resulted in more discussions when requests for money come up, looking for alternative solutions. We have also seen more donations passed along the service structure with groups and Areas less likely to hold onto money.

Please share some solutions to challenges your region has faced since WSC 2006.

We have faced challenges with breakaway groups in our region that have caused disunity in some areas. The members of the groups talk of being 'recovered', the groups have 'rules' such as wearing a tie to be a speaker, not sharing any problems or anything negative, not

partaking in Tradition 7 if members go to any other meetings, working other fellowship programs. We have asked other regions for their experience on this and are still working on finding the solution to this challenge.

We have also been challenged with Fundraising & Entertainment Committee's at a regional level and recently put together an ad-hoc committee to see how other regions do this to try and get some experience. So far the feedback has been that they don't focus on fundraising just fun and also a lot of regions do not have this committee at a regional level, unless for a specific event and then an ad-hoc committee is formed.

Please share some highlights or successes your region has experienced since WSC 2006.

We have produced a new pamphlet about 'Service and why we do it' and 'Self Supporting' (available of the ftp site) to try and encourage members. We have been recognized by the National Institute for Clinical Excellence as a viable way of recovery. We have changed our policy on donations to the EDM & WSO so are now donating a lot more funds through the service structure. We have also started to pay back the original literature debt we incurred when we set up NA in the UK.

What additional information would you like to share with other conference participants? Our Regional Resource Committee is once again up and running, it's main purpose is to keep records of all policies and procedures and guidelines. It is invaluable at the RSC when clarification is needed on past motions. We are also working towards the Resource Committee collecting all reports prior to RSC and distributing them in one document before the meeting.

Literature Source: WRSC purchases its literature from the Wisconsin Regional Service Office. H&I_Literature: The WRSC Regional H&I functions are handled by the Area Service committees with various amounts per Area. Some jail facilities are supplied by local Home-Groups. This makes it more difficult to bring an exact figure. It would be safe to say that an excess of \$25,000 combined expenditure was done by Areas & Home-Groups & Fund Raisers. Another service provided to the Wisconsin Region is in the form of Project Hope. They buy "Books for Crooks" and are self-supporting through donations & fundraisers. The address: KMASC-Project Hope P.O. Box 1022, Sheboygan, WI 53082. In 2007, over \$6,000 worth of literature was distributed to incarcerated individuals, at their request, at no cost to themselves. Project Hope is facilitated by volunteers and their services are made known solely by word of mouth. While this service was originally intended to service WISCONSIN REGION, literature has been distributed to other states, as well -Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, and Missouri.

Wisconsin Region

One was focused on predatory behaviors in NA, another on "Who's Missing?" at WSNAC, Accessibility/Additional Needs. Who's missing? Addicts brought up the fact that culturally different ethnicities like Hmong, Indigenous Native Americans, Hispanics) were often missing because of language & cultural differences and how the different cultures relate to people outside of their core group or family group.

PR Experience: Overall, PR in Wisconsin is healthy, dynamic, and growing. PR has added 2 new professional conferences to its schedule since 2006. PR maintains a Regional Helpline that gives each Area its own Helpline. PR maintains a Regional website. www.wisconsinna.org PR maintains a complete on-line meeting directory of each Area. PR maintains a Regional calendar and posts the events and activities of the Areas on-line. PR publishes a complete Regional meeting directory twice each year. PR works in cooperation with the local Area PR committees to provide human resources for the professional conferences. PR assists the local Areas with PR workshops and additional literature for local PR initiatives. PR assists the Areas in maintaining their own area meeting lists. (Excel files of meeting lists) PR has appointed a NAWS Web Contact to update the NAWS on-line database.

National Rural Institute on Alcohol & Drug Abuse Conference June 3-7, 2007
WRSC & NAWS, in partnership, attended the 23rd annual National Rural Institute on
Alcohol & Drug Abuse Conference June 3-7, 2007 in Menomonie, WI. The conference was well organized & attended. There were 8 exhibitors in the main hall. Most of the registrants were involved in either treatment or drug court or both in their home states. Several registrants were also members of NA.

The Items of most interest were multi-language key-tags as well as other literature items. Many key tags & many mini-texts were given away, & other lit sold. Great interest in "In Times of Illness" was shown. During one of the plenary, there were discussions from the floor concerning methadone & other drug replacement treatments. While we were not asked any specific questions, there was much discussion of medication in treatment. It was noted in the opening plenary that the most abused drugs in rural communities were alcohol and crystal methamphetamine imported from Mexico. It was noted that NA was not given the same respect as AA. When NA was mentioned it was as if almost an afterthought. The drug problem in Iran was discussed in one plenary, and only mentioned AA. Considering NA's development in Iran in recent years, that seemed to be unknowledgeable at best & disrespectful at worst. The words "Drug Problem" & "AA" were often used in the same sentence. It is obvious to us that more PR needs to be done in this area. We have some specific Ideas that could illustrate the broad scope and appeal of NA at these conferences:

- 1) Equip future PR-Teams with a current full-color map of the world showing the number of meeting by country & a growth rate chart for display.
- 2) Create a handout or display of the current language translation projects in progress and translated pieces currently in circulation.
- 3) When Listing NA in the program as exhibitors, include a brief statement describing the program. (The only statement in the NRIADA program was that literature would be available.)

In addition to the multi-language key-tags, it was suggested that the multi-language IP#1 packet be included as handouts at future conferences. Our presence at this conference was considered an over-all success and the PR-team looks forward to attending it again.

Women & Poverty Conference Madison, Wisconsin 5&6 Sept, 2007

The Badgerland Area of NA participated in the conference with the organization & planning of the Area PR chair. The Area and the Region applaud their efforts. Local meeting directories were distributed, as were phone line fliers, sample of all the key tags. Spanish & English copies of the literature were there

for display purposes. Registration & literature was supplied by WRSC. The conference attendance was relatively small. Not many visited exhibit tables although professionals tended to stay longer and were more intently focused on finding info & using NA resources to address their clients' issues than at WAAODA. One individual asked how to make the clear connection between drug use and violence to their clients. Another from DOC

in Janesville, WI seemed interested in having IP's at their Probation/Parole offices. It was noted that BASC (Madison) provides Literature displays in their correction offices. Other area H&I subcommittees have these displays in their Incarceration facilities, as well. Women and Poverty added a workshop on Substance Abuse & Poverty as a direct result of NA's annual presence at this conference.

Second Annual Mental Health & Substance Abuse Services Training Conference November 2006: We attended the Second Annual Mental Health & Substance Abuse Services Training Conference in Stevens Point on October 25-26. More than 80 information packets were distributed, as well as all available white books. The conference was well attended. The PowerPoint presentation ran continuously and drew attention to our exhibit. The conference rotates around the state and as yet has not published the location of next year's conference. Our RDA attended the conference and has recommended that we continue to attend this conference, and next time, bring more literature. \$100 was budgeted for literature.

3rd Annual MHSA Conference-Oct 2007

WRSC was represented by the RDA and another addict again this year. Over 100 IP-Packets were distributed mixed with English & their Spanish counterpart-IP's. More than 100 White booklets were distributed as well as Basic Texts, How & Whys, & Step Working Guides that were sold. This conference is interested in having a member of NA address the conference next year. This option is to be negotiated by the PR facilitator. The Conference material, registration, & mileage was funded by the WRSC. A PowerPoint display was run continuously as well, creating much interest and attracting much attention.

2007 WAAODA Conference Report:

I. Training sessions: Two training sessions were held prior to the WAAODA conference. Half of the volunteers attended one session, and the other half attended the second session. This was helpful in providing an intimate atmosphere for covering all of the information for the conference, and also discussion about the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) from the PR Handbook. II. Participation in WAAODA: Overall, our participation was a success. Everyone was present for their scheduled time, and our members all received positive feedback from our participation in the event. We received many comments, and some of the comments, requests, and questions we received are summarized here. In general, many people commented on the helpfulness of having our books and IP's in Spanish. The Spanish literature and the WI Regional Meeting Directories were very popular. A couple of people asked about Spanish speaking meetings in NA. Many people asked about getting support for or starting meetings in rural areas like Oak County, or small towns in rural Wisconsin like Dodgeville. Many of these people acknowledge a desperate need for NA meetings in these areas, and they either die out because of a lack of support, or they haven't been started. These people were referred to the WI Regional Service Office and the Outreach subcommittees. There were many comments about addressing the needs of the suffering addict in rural areas.

- Many people said that they take the Regional Meeting or local meeting lists and make photocopies for their work environments.
- Many people stopped by our booth to ask us the difference between NA and AA.
- Lots of people requested Milwaukee area meetings.
- A couple of people asked about predators in the rooms and the general safety of people from

predators.

- A few people asked about young people's groups and meetings. Several people expressed gratitude for making available the Youth & Recovery IP.
- A few people asked about the strength of the NA community in different areas, including Madison
- Many professionals tried to take the key tags we had for display only. They said they wanted them for display and use at their offices. Several others asked for free literature to be made available to them.

Recovery Rally Report — September 15, 2007

The Recovery Rally was held Sept. 15 2007 from 4 to 9pm at Elver Park. We were given 20% of the remaining literature from the Women and Poverty 2007 conference from Region and returned the 80% to the Regional PR subcommittee to use at the Corrections Conference and the MHSA Conference. This literature was used in combination with our stock of literature. The Recovery Rally was overall a success, The volunteers visited with people that came to the table. NA was the only booth at the Recovery Rally and this worked out nicely. We met with a few professionals, and also made a good contact with a new clean living house opening up on campus. Most of the people who visited were lay people, either addicts themselves or friends and family of addicts. Largely we answered questions and gave away meeting lists. There was a bus load of people from Milwaukee, so we gave away several Milwaukee meeting lists. The BASC PR subcommittee would like to thank the WI Region for their ongoing support.

Regional Helpline Experience: The purpose of the RSC is to collectively provide services for all the Areas that the individual Areas may not be able to provide for themselves. Of the 16 Areas that comprise the Region, only 4 were able to maintain Helplines. Collectively, those 4 Areas spent approximately \$1200 or more per month for these services. The Region also maintained a central information line that only provided meeting locations. That central line was the only Helpline service the other 12 Areas had access to. That service cost the Region about \$300 monthly. So, collectively, \$1500 was being spent each month on Helpline services that failed to adequately serve All the Areas.

The new Helpline serves all 16 Areas equally. It provides the same services to all the Areas. Each Area can set it up as they wish, as simply or as elaborately as they choose. It costs about \$170 per month to provide this for all 16 Areas. This "enabled" at least 4 Areas to terminate a costly financial liability and use that money more productively and responsibly. The 11th Concept clearly addresses this. The net savings around the Region add up to about \$14,000 annually. Those savings "enable" the Areas to better carry the message, and to proportionally

increase donations to the WRSC, effectively paying for the Helpline system with increased donations. That's \$170 per month divided by 16 Areas, or about \$11 a month per Area. This is called creating an economy of scale. Areas that could not afford their own Helplines now have them. All 16 Area Helplines can be accessed from each individual Helpline number or through the central number. It is an efficient and very cost effective system.

Area Helpline Experience: Until the installation of the new all inclusive Regional Helpline, only 4 Area were able to maintain their own Helplines. Each Area was spending about \$300 per month on the service. The costs were becoming crippling to the Areas and only provided local coverage.

The new Helpline serves all 16 Areas equally. It provides the same services to all the Areas. Each Area can set it up as they wish, as simply or as elaborately as they choose. It costs about \$170 per month to provide this for all 16 Areas. This enabled those 4 Areas to terminate a costly financial liability and use that money more productively and responsibly. The 11th Concept clearly addresses this. The net savings around the Region add up to about \$14,000 annually. Those savings enable the Areas to better carry the

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message, and to proportionally increase donations to the WRSC, effectively paying for the Helpline system with increased donations. That's \$170 per month divided by 16 Areas, or about \$11 a month per Area. This is called creating an economy of scale. Areas that could not afford their own Helplines now have

them. All 16 Area Helplines can be accessed from each individual Helpline number or through the central number. It is an efficient and very cost effective system.

The Halloo System is being used and allows access for a meeting directory line, as well as live call forwarding if the particular Area is able to man or operate such a service. One drawback to the system is not of the system itself but of the servants overseeing the system. If the system is not checked periodically, glitches that may occur go unheeded. Meeting updates need to be maintained, such as meeting times, dates, & places as changes occur. This creates multiple points of responsibility in the region and requires commitment & vigilance on the part of the Area.

CAR Workshop Experience: The Region did not host a CAR workshop. Some Areas did. Overall, they were sparsely attended. The questions were addressed as well.

CAR Workshop Experience2: The answers to the questions showed a lack of knowledge about the literatures in question and a general apathy for most of it.

Local Discussion: Who's missing? Predatory behavior Accessability

Challenges:

1) Helplines and Regional coverage of viable Helplines.

Solution: Institute the Halloo System Regional Helpline to equip all Areas with an interconnected system at a substantial savings to the Region and to the individual areas.

2) Public Resource Committee coverage.

Solution: More volunteers, better planning; Soliciting assistance from NAWS, Individual ASC's helping to carry on at the "Home" level, i.e. Big Rivers providing coverage at the Meth Conference in Toma, WI & Badgerland Area stepping up for WAAODA & Women in Poverty.

3) Relationship between the WRSC & WSNAC B.O.D.

Solution: Changing the Regional Meeting Site Rotation.

Secondary Challenge: Eliminated meeting spaced at WRSC & every WRSC meeting & no room for WRSO(Office) or WSNAAC.-NO SOLUTION

4) Challenge: SERVICE DELIVERY

Solution: New Format-CBDM Delivered by PURPOSE INVENTORY Ad-Hoc

Successes: CBDM-format Regional Helpline System Increased Success of <u>Project Hope</u> in delivery more literature to more incarcerated addicts—WE BUY "BOOKS FOR CROOKS" to keep "THUGS OFF DRUGS"

Individual/group autonomy may sometime override the unity we need to carry the message and ultimately, save lives. A challenge for me is to stay motivated in the face of adversity and not take reactions (or lack of) and responses (or, lack of) personally. It reminds me to keep my own house in order and perform the tasks delegated to me in a timely, orderly fashion.

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AUTONOMY ZONAL FORUM REPORT

WSC 2008

The Autonomy Zone (AZF) is comprised of six Narcotics Anonymous regions. These regions are located in the mid-eastern portion of the United States. These regions are Greater Philadelphia (SE Pennsylvania), Mountaineer (W Virginia, Virginia), Free State (Maryland, Delaware, Virginia), Chesapeake & Potomac (Maryland, N Virginia, Washington DC), Eastern PA (Pennsylvania) and Central Atlantic Region [formally Region of Virginias]

(W Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, N Carolina). We meet twice a year on a rotating basis. We recently met on January 26, 2008 in Fredericksburg, VA, hosted by Central Atlantic.

The Eastern PA Region (EPARNA) continues to function as a region, carrying our message of recovery and is an asset to our Zonal Forum. Our continued welcome to EPARNA as we support them in their efforts to be seated at the World Service Conference. This region and its parent region, Greater Phila, have successfully integrated a multi-regional meeting list to better serve both geographical areas. Each region, however, maintains separate websites with respective links.

The Region of the Virginias has recently voted to change their name to "*Central Atlantic Region*" with an intended purpose of encompassing the geography involved. All services will remain other than the house cleaning involving the new name; i.e. convention name, literature stamping, etc.

All of our regions have been involved with the Issue Discussion Topics (IDT) in one form or another within their regions. Regional and GSR Assemblies are also being held in order to foster communication about these IDT issues. At our last Autonomy Zonal Forum hosted by Central Atlantic, we had several World Board members present to help discussion on WSC information, CAR/CAT mostly. Thank you Craig, Mark and WSO special worker Travis for supporting us for the first time in our forums history! We appreciated your input and look forward to your return engagement.

Last WSC '06, some of our regions were discussing new insurance plans for the groups and other NA functions. EPARNA has obtained a reasonable cost effective insurance plan from a company in Pennsylvania. This is less than \$15 yearly, per facility where NA meets for recovery and service functions.

European Delegates Meeting (EDM) Report To The World Service Conference

April 2008

EDM MISSION STATEMENT

"The EDM is a European based forum of multi-lingual and multi-cultural NA communities inside and outside Europe, whose mission is to further their common welfare and unity, support their growth and help them fulfil their primary purpose of carrying the NA message to the still suffering addict"

Greetings to the World Service Conference participants from the European Delegates Meeting. We hope that you are having a constructive meeting during this week.

The EDM meets twice yearly, for four days - once during the summer at the European Conference and Convention (ECCNA) and once during the winter, usually hosted by a developing NA Community. Since WSC 2006 we have held EDM meetings in Portugal, Switzerland, the UK and Budapest. We have an annual operating budget of approximately € 20,000 (US\$ 30,000) This is funded by contributions from member and other NA Communities and funds generated by the ECCNA.

The communities that have been in attendance at our meetings since 2006 are: Egypt, France, French Speaking Swiss Area, German Speaking Region, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, Turkey, UK, Ukraine and Western Russia. Belgium, Bulgaria, Denmark, Netherlands and Slovenia are also member communities of the EDM who have not attended the EDM meetings in the last two years. We include these communities in our mailings, and invite them to send us a report each meeting on how their communities are developing, and ask them to include any requests for help or experience that the EDM may be able to help with. Since the last WSC we have also been in contact with members and groups in Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina and Georgia. In July 2007 Malta was welcomed as our newest member of the EDM.

Fellowship Development

There continues to be a large need for help and support from developing communities throughout Europe. To help meet this need we continue to fund attendance at the EDM meetings for some developing communities, and we also fund representatives from the EDM Fellowship Development Resource Pool to travel to meet with local members of the fellowship to facilitate service workshops and share experience. Since 2006, the EDM body has facilitated and funded a Fellowship Development visit to Hungary. In conjunction with NAWS we also sent a representative to Turkey to do FD activity with the local fellowship and attend ECAD, the European Cities Against Drugs conference.

We have also had great developments in the area of neighboring communities "sponsoring' each other with the exchange of experience and support. Much of these efforts arose from a series of workshops and round-table discussions held by the EDM Fellowship Development (FD) committee during our meetings in 2006 and 2007. These activities have included sending Norwegian trusted servants to Northern Sweden and to a Danish Convention, German H&I members to a Dutch service workshop and Swedish members to the Polish Regional Service Conference. We are really excited by this development in our FD work, and hope to be able to report on many more such activities at the next WSC. These FD efforts have all been facilitated and most have been part-funded by the EDM.

Another part of our FD efforts is in facilitating two day Workshops after our winter meeting, in partnership with and with the support of NAWS. The most recent of these took place in Budapest, Hungary and had members from Hungary, Estonia, Ukraine, Slovenia, Lithuania, Bosnia, Malta, Poland, Latvia, Prague, Croatia, Italy, Turkey as well as several delegates from EDM participating.

They were a great success and we are very grateful to NAWS for their huge amount of help and support, without which these workshops would not be possible.

Legal Association

The legal association has been working well, and we are very grateful for the large amount of practical support given to the association by staff at the WSO - Europe. The four members of the EDM Steering Committee serve as directors of the Legal Association, which called EDMNA and has been incorporated in Belgium since 2005. There have been some issues with adapting our accounting methods to the requirements of the Belgian tax authorities, but with the help of the WSO-E we are meeting the challenges.

Website

Our website has been online since July 2007, and is growing all the time. At the moment we have over 60 distinct pages of information, including "About Us" a document about the EDM, currently translated into 7 languages.

The EDM website is at www.edmna.org and we encourage other NA communities to link to it.

European Convention and Conference (ECCNA)

Since WSC 2006 we have held the ECCNA in Porto, Portugal and Llandudno, Wales, UK. Both were a great success, and enjoyed by members from all over Europe and the world. We would like to extend a warm invitation to the next European Convention and Conference, which will be held n Helsinki, Finland in July 2008.

At our meeting in Geneva we decided not to hold an ECCNA during summer 2009, as the World Convention will be taking place then in Barcelona, Spain. This has given us a financial challenge, as we will not have any proceeds from the ECCNA that year. We continue to explore different ways of meeting the shortfall in our budget.

NAWS

We would like to thank World Services & the World Board for the ongoing support we have received over the last two years, with the workshops that were held in the Ukraine, and Lithuania in 2006, and the attendance of several WB directors and NAWS staff at our meetings. We would also like to extend our deep gratitude to the WSO staff members for the dedicated work they do in dealing with our requests and needs. Through out the European zone

LATIN AMERICAN ZONAL FORUM REPORT TO THE WSC 2008

Fraternal regards from all the communities belonging to the Latin American Zonal Forum (LAZF)—Argentina, Área de Habla Hispana del Sur de California (Southern California Spanish-speaking Area), Baja-Son, Bolivia, Brasil (Brazil), Brasil Sur (Southern Brazil), Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Chile, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Grande Sao Paulo, Honduras, México, México Occidente (West Mexico), Nicaragua, Panamá, Paraguay, Perú, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, Uruguay, and Venezuela. It is a privilege for us, thanks to our higher power, to be able to share with you about the growth of the Fellowship in this part of the world.

We remember that first casual meeting during WSC 1993, when 4 RSRs, inspired by the WSC 1992's decision to recognize Zonal Forums as bodies belonging to the worldwide Fellowship, joined efforts to begin a movement that came to be known as Convención-Conferencia Latinoamericana (Latin American Convention-Conference). Back then, Hispanic members residing in New York and Florida gave us their support. Thus, a transformation and growth process started in which Latin America began participating on a biannual basis in the following fashion:

• First Conference

In November 1993, representatives from five regions held a meeting.

Second Convention-Conference

Held in the great city of Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) in 1995 with six regions attending.

Third Convention-Conference

Held in Buenos Aires, with the participation of nine regions. On this occasion it was decided to separate the conventions, that is, the local convention was separated from the Latin American Convention due to some confusion generated by holding them at the same time.

In 1998, the names of the meetings were changed to Latin American Zonal Forum (LAZF) and Latin American Convention.

Fourth Meeting

Held in 1999 in Guayaquil, Ecuador, during the IV CLANA (Latin American Convention of NA), with approximately four hundred people attending. There were 14 regions attending the LAZF.

Fifth Meeting

The V CLANA was held in Costa Rica in 2001, with an attendance of over 600 people from different parts of the world. For the first time 20 regions attended the LAZF.

Sixth Meeting

The VI Forum was held in 2004 in en Montevideo, Uruguay, with 17 communities attending. For the first time members from Cuba attended.

Seventh Meeting

The VII Forum was held in Panamá City, with 20 communities in attendance. During the proceedings the following communities were admitted —Área de Habla Hispana del Sur de California (AHHSCNA) [Southern California Spanish-speaking Area], Brasil Sur (Southern Brazil), and Paraguay.

• Eighth Meeting

On this occasion, we meet at SESC DE GRUSSAÍ, Brazil, on October 25-28 2007, with an attendance of about 400. The Grande de Sao Paulo (Great Sao Paulo) community joined us. The communities of Ecuador, México, México Occidente (West Mexico), and Cuba did not attend.

Important Aspects:

Communication

We nust remember certain aspects regarding communications such as the novelty of Cuba's presence in the VI Forum thanks to the cooperation of the WSO. Their participation is important to all of us due to the widely-known political situation in that country which makes it difficult to maintain close communication with members in Cuba. Because of this situation, we had to become very careful regarding our exchange of information with them. Even though that communication had broken, the world office was contacted anew in late 2007 as a result of The NA Way magazine. World Services referred their letter to us and we responded, hoping to restore our contacts, expressing our availability to help them in any way we could.

We work hard to maintain an exchange with our brothers from Latin communities in the United States. Proof of this is the opportunity that arose for their participation in the VI Forum.

We meet every two years and avail ourselves of the World Service Conference to hold a general meeting of the Forum sometime during that week. The effort to maintain constant meetings and communication is supported by Internet tools. In the beginning, members of the fellowship were paying for the service but now it is being paid with Forum funds, and we have set up a new site and a new hosting domain. This tool has made it possible to establish the new www.fzlatino.org web site, with a great deal of information about NA, the regions belonging to the LAZF, regional activities, and the like. We have also set up an e-mail, na-foro@gruposyahoo.com, with the purpose of maintaining constant communication that can foster the development of the communities, provide information about Forum meetings, lend support to its member communities and individual members, as well as give us the ability to contact our delegates, workgroup coordinators, and the Executive Committee (EC) of the LAZF.

This way, we have been able to hold bimonthly electronic (virtual) meetings of the Forum's EC in order to move forward and coordinate the continuity of projects as well as other affairs of the Zonal Forum. It is important to highlight that the EC is consists of 4 trusted servants elected by the delegates of the communities for a four-year fixed period. Elected positions are chair, vice-chair, treasurer, and secretary. Afterwards, the selected servants meet as an EC and select the positions they will fill among themselves. In general, decisions are made by consensus.

We are trully convinced that communication is very important. Proof of this is that owing to constant communication among NA in Nicaragua, Costa Rica, Panamá, El Salvador, Honduras, and Guatemala, the EC has participated in all 3 "Encuentro de Delegados Centroamericanos" (Central American

Delegates Gathering) held in Honduras, El Salvador, and Nicaragua, and was able to support service efforts of the communities attending this multi-regional event.

Other accomplishments we have had because of communications have been the support we got from NAWS, neighboring communities as well as the EC, which welcomed Paraguay at the VII Forum and developed a service structure for them. Paraguay has joined the Forum's distribution list.

In like fashion, a development project for NA Bolivia was started in coordination with and financed by World Services, and headed by the LAZF's chair at the time. Likewise, we have produced a Zonal Directory, a list of addresses of the Forum's servants, and the minutes for the LAZF's meetings.

The Procedural Guidelines was a project started at the V Forum. Voted as provisional guidelines at the VI Forum, they had been undergoing a review and changes process by request of the VII Forum. They were approved in our last meeting, the VIII Forum, held in Brazil.

Within the structure of the LAZF, we have workgroups that help us carry out the tasks assigned to them by the Delegates. Among the workgroups are: Translations Committee, CLANA Committee, Internet (Web page) Committee, Human Resources Committee (HR Panel), and Latinas Newsletter Committee. All workgroups maintain constant communication and coordination of their services with the Forum's Executive Committee (EC) through its Vice-chair.

The translations team translated the NA Public Relations Manual with the help of a professional translator; World Services is currently revising it. Another project near completion is the translation of the H&I Manual. Work on personal stories for the Spanish White Book was completed and the final selection was sent to the WSO. We also took part in the correction of the Just for Today for January 5.

It is equally important to point out that we have completed working on the Forum's web site. As has been mentioned before, its address is www.fzlatino.com

We are still working on the Latinas Newsletter magazine though we are having difficulties in finding leaders who want to assume that responsibility. We were able to complete our fourth edition; its contents are worked on through the Internet via the na-foro.

The GSR Guide process is on hold and we have not been able to make much headway.

We were able to hold our VII meeting in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, October 25-28, 2007. Its theme was "MENSAJE SIN FRONTERAS" ("A Message Without Borders"). In that event, we held the CLANA as well as our VIII Zonal Forum. The community of Venezuela was selected as the host of our next Zonal Forum to be held in 2009.

We are re-structuring our Human Resources Panel and are asking members who want to serve to join the pool of Panel servants, that is, to register their résumé with the HR Panel.

The EC is receiving recommendations from the Panel regarding the open service positions. It will make its decisions later on.

Another point of great import to us is self-support, which depends in great measure on income generated from 70% of CLANA's profits, since the other 30% goes to the region hosting the event. We mention this because is widely known the financial difficulties many of our Latin American communities, as well as Latin American countries in general, go through. Regardless of this, the practice of self-support has always been a challenge for the Forum. That is why we are always searching mechanisms to help us achieve this end. We make pins, stickers with NA's service logo, T-shirts, and receive contributions from our communities and individual NA members. All these efforts have resulted in our

diminishing reliance on the generous and unconditional support of world services. We have made progress and can inform you that we have been supporting ourselves with our own Latin American Zonal Forum funds since our VII Forum. We are developing a plan of self-support for our 2007-2009 period. In this regard, we cannot fail to mention the Chesapeake-Potomac Region, which has been supporting us with their donations.

Our last Forum in Brazil left us with specific tasks to be done, aside from the feeling from our communities as to where we need to go. That is why, as an EC, we continue working toward maintaining a fluid communication with DRs from different communities using all necessary mechanisms such as periodic newsletters, a method we are just beginning to implement, and the permanent link through the na-foro distribution list. We are also planning the work that needs to be accomplished within the next two years and the importance of carrying out a development project of communities with big needs, which we have started developing.

We cannot end without expressing our immense gratitude for the brotherly support our fellow Anthony Edmondson has given us; he carries on with the work of George Hollagan whom we always remember. This growth is a result of Anthony's unconditional love toward us. He dedicates himself to tending to our needs and requests with the support of our fellow Johnny Lamprea and the WSO staff. In conclusion, we would like to thank the entire World Board and various Zonal Forums for sharing their experience, strength, and hope.

Midwest Zonal Forum Report to WSC 2008

Greetings from the Midwest Zonal Forum (MZF). We are grateful for this opportunity to share some information about ourselves, and our recent development, with the WSC and the fellowship as a whole. The MZF continues to function as a service entity whose purpose is to provide participants with a vehicle for the discussion and exchange of ideas on problems and issues confronting regional service conferences and committees in the Midwestern United States. Current participating regions in the MZF include Chicagoland, Minnesota, Greater Illinois, Indiana, Metro-Detroit, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin. We also occasionally have visitors from other surrounding regions. We have no formal seating criteria. When a regional service body says they are part of our forum, we welcome their participation. Participation in the MZF is not limited to Regional Delegates and Alternated. Any addict who attends has full participation rights at the MZF.

Since our inception --as the Midwest Caucus at WSC '88-- we have been able to remain a consensus driven service body. In other words if any participant is uncomfortable with a proposed decision, we do not implement it. Nonetheless, we are generally able to find common ground and move forward, albeit slowly at times. Some discussion has developed during the past year regarding whether a revision in our consensus building process would better facilitate the flow of business. More will be revealed...Traditionally we have met on a quarterly basis including an informal meeting that takes place at the WSC. The meeting at the Conference remains informal because many interested addicts from the Midwest U.S. would not have the opportunity to attend. We feel that to conduct business at this meeting would go against the spirit of our practice of allowing any interested addict who attends to have full participation rights at our meetings. Our other MZF meetings rotate from one region to the next. The MZF established a permanent regional rotation at our July 1999 meeting in Detroit, Michigan. We also formalized our trusted servant rotation at this meeting. We currently have two co-facilitators, a secretary and a treasurer, as well as a web coordinator. A discussion has developed regarding the necessity of meeting four times a year now that the two-year WSC cycle is firmly in place. Circumstances have resulted in the MZF meeting less than quarterly during the past two years and a proposal was made to scale the MZF back to two formal meetings per year. The participants at the 11/2007 meeting were not comfortable with permanently limiting the MZF to two meetings but did agree to scheduling two formal meetings in 2008 and three in 2009. In addition to our regularly scheduled meetings, The MZF hosts a Multi-Regional Conference Agenda Report Workshop when the CAR and CAT become available. Traditionally this workshop has always taken place in the Michigan Region but during the past year the MZF decided to add it to the regular meeting rotation.

The MZF continues to maintain a website at www.mzfna.org The site contains historical information about the MZF, minutes from our quarterly meetings, information about upcoming events, contact information and links to participating regions. Additionally, the site lists our Mission Statement, guidelines and Statement of Purpose. Discussion about how to develop the site into a more useful tool for the service bodies in the Midwest United States has been ongoing and to date has been inconclusive.

The MZF continues to fund its trusted servants to attend its meetings –when the money is available. This practice has generated an ongoing discussion regarding the evolving purpose of the MZF -- specifically what we can and/or should do in the way of direct services. Any such services would need to represent prudent use of NA funds while not overlapping their efforts with the zone's member service entities. During the previous conference cycle the MZF has identified a significant void in the provision of public relations services in the Midwest United States, and a work group was established to determine how we could assist local service bodies with projects beyond the scope of their resources, as well as how we could most effectively train addicts in the local fellowships within our zone to provide more effective PR services. The forum has also discussed the feasibility of offering our collective experience. strength and hope to NA World Services to assist with proposed and requested PR initiatives in the Midwestern United States. In the past the MZF has made itself available to assist with multi-regional and regional service learning days. During the past year it became apparent to many MZF participants that with its current structure, providing specific direct services such as PR initiatives is less than feasible. Therefore the forum has consensually agreed to focus on providing workshops for the local fellowships at which the MZF meets. Hosting Regions will request input for workshop topics from the local fellowship. Consensus was reached that, after specific local requests, as a communication link between NAWS and the Regions and Areas. the Issue Discussion Topics, CAR, and CAT should be our primary topic focus. If the hosting fellowship has already thoroughly workshopped the IDTS, and no other topics are suggested, workshop discussions will focus on the 12 Traditions and 12 Concepts of Service.

The next formal meeting of the MZF will take place in October 2008 hosted by the Minnesota Region. The specific date and location will be posted on the World Services Calendar, as well as at www.mzfna.org.

WSC 2008 Regional Reports NORTHEAST ZONAL FORUM REPORT

The North East Zonal Forum was born out of an idea that was nurtured from the first East Coast Convention in 1980. Sometime in the 80's Several Regions got together to discuss what NA is like in other parts of the country. Then at the WSC in Dallas Texas in 1992, a couple of other parts of the NA World had already been meeting as Forums or Zones. Many non-US Regions attended the WSC for the first time and many were seated. One committee produced a paper about Zonal Forums. Again, a thought was expressed about starting a North East Zonal Forum. The Regions of the northeastern USA were approached about meeting and a small meeting was held.

The next meeting was at the Multi-Regional in New York City. Members of the Western States Forum and Canadian Assembly shared their experience, strength, and hope. We agreed to write a simple Statement of Function and Purpose. Participants shared on the unmanageability of the East Coast Convention (ECC) in each of our Regions over the past 7 or 8 years. The ECC couldn't find an area in any of our Regions to continue and it ceased to exist. We now have a concrete example of the benefits of talking and sharing with other Regions. Several addicts met at the Connecticut Regional Convention in Stamford and wrote our Statement of Function and Purpose.

We met next after MARLCNA. >From that arose one of our first guidelines--that the NEZF will not meet in conjunction with another event; we would discuss issues in common to the areas and groups and our Regions. The NEZF is comprised of 13 Regions of the Northeast portion of the United States. ABCD, Buckeye, Connecticut, Eastern New York, Greater New York, Mid Atlantic, Mountain Valley, New England, New Jersey, Northern New England, Northern New Jersey, Northern New York, and Western New York, all current and active members and Tri-State is a current in-active member. We meet twice a year for 2 days, once in the winter, usually in January or February, and once in the summer, usually June or July. We meet on weekends, with Orientation on Friday Night, Discussion Topics, on Saturday, and Business Sessions on Sunday usually ending at 12 Noon. We elect our chair and vice chair for one-year terms, and our secretary for two years. These are non-funded positions.

After many painstaking meetings discussing our proposed GUIDELINES, at the meeting in Pittsburgh in June of 2002, we finally took a giant step forward and approved our GUIDELINES. We as a body have decided now that we have them we will use them. When we started, the meetings were hosted by Regions who volunteered to host them mostly in the New Jersey Region, then New York City, upstate New York and Pennsylvania. We now follow our Guidelines and the Alphabetical Rotation to Host. I'm glad to say it is working well and all 14 Regions have hosted the NEZF. Northern New England was the only Region that hadn't hosted, but hosted the NEZF the Summer of 2006 and completed the cycle of all regions hosting the NEZF at least once. We now are leaning to a Consensus Decision making Process. We entertain proposals rather then motions. We discuss World Issues and Hot Topics. We've had the privilege of having World Board Members do a CAR Workshop at our meetings, first at La Guardia in New York, January 2004 and recently at Newark Airport this past January 2006 and in Williamsville New York near Buffalo in January 2008.

We had an ad-hoc committee work on a Power Point Presentation on NA and the Services we provide, which is something that all the members of the (NEZF) are very proud of. We now have an ad-hoc committee in place working on putting together a (ZWW) Zone Wide-Workshop. It's still in the planning stage but as we say in NA, "More Will be Revealed". Our ad-hoc committee on (ZWW) is pointing to possibly Eastern New York in June of 2009 as a possible sight for our first (ZWW). At our last Zonal Forum a Proposal was passed to read our Mission statement before every session that we meet starting in June 2008. We are still in the process of setting up a web-site for our zone and when it gets up and running we will be able to report on it further.
